MAY VOTE ON CHANGE IN BOARD OF HEALTH

City Clerk of Opinion Matter Must Be Decided by Ballot.

No change in the present form of local board of health can be instituted, as recently suggested by civic administrators, without the permission of the Provincial Legislature, according to City Clerk Sam Baker. The clerk points out further that the federal health authorities also approve of the present form.

As in the case of the proposed commission form of government, it is more than likely that the people would be called upon to register their opinion at a plebiscite, after which it would be imperative to appeal to both the Ontario Legislature and the federal government at Ottawa for permission to change. And there is absolutely not even a hint of assurance that approval would be forthcoming.

City officials state that the board of health situation is similar to the police commission. Certain members must hold office, as for instance, the city health officer.

City Clerk Baker holds the opinion that neither the police nor the health boards should be elected by a vote of the people at large, but should remain as at present.

OWNERS IN EAST END OBJECT TO TAXATION

City Will Sell Considerable Property in 1924 To Secure Payment.

Considerable property in the annexed districts of East London will be sold in 1924 by the city to secure unpaid taxes, the city treasurer announced today.

The owners of more than 30 lots have returned their 1921 tax notices with the information that the property is not worth the assessment levied in 1920. Treasurer Bell explains that the law requires that three years elapse from the date of payment before the city may sell. This time limit is apparently set in order to allow the owners plenty of time to change their mind and pay.

Considerable property will be listed in a similar manner after the three-year period expires for payment in 1921.

POLICE AFFORD PROTECTION AT WESTERN FAIR GROUNDS

The Western Fair is being afforded its usual police protection of a sergeant and four men, in addition to two constables stationed in the ring, Chief of Police Robert Birrell stated today.

"The men take over their duties there in the regular shifts," the chief declared. "We have had the same number of men stationed at the Fair for the past four years, and find that they can handle things quite satisfactorily. There are always two men on duty in the ring."

USING COURTS TESTS IN GRADE 2 CLASSES

London Teachers Hope To Secure Maximum of Efficiency in Arithmetic.

By using a revised form of the Courts tests, which are in use in American schools, the board of education hopes to bring about greater neatness, accuracy and speed in mechanical arithmetic in the lower grades of the public schools. The Courts tests have been used in Detroit and other American cities for a number of years. School Inspectors Greer and Wheable have revised them in order to have them meet the requirements of Ontario and London schools. Last year the tests were tried out in Miss Dora Rogers's class at Simcoe street school, and such satisfactory results were obtained that it was decided to use them in all Grade 2 classes of the city schools.

The pupils are provided with tissue paper pads and lesson cards. The cards contain from 75 to 90 exercises in addition. The children place the cards under a tissue paper sheet, and begin adding when the teacher calls time. The children are cautioned to make good figures and not to hurry. They are advised to work only as rapidly as they can without making mistakes, for neatness, accuracy and speed are desired in the order named.

Eight minutes are allowed for the tests.

To score the paper, the lesson card is turned over, and the answers found on the opposite side. The correct answers will show just above or below those of the pupil. An X is placed over the answers which are wrong.

An answer is to be counted wrong if the figures are poorly made, if any figure has been marked over or erased, or if any figure is incorrect. The number of answers found correct is placed

in the blank at the foot of the sheet and the sheet detached. The scores are recorded in a daily record, which accompanies the pad. If successful the pupil hand the teacher the lesson card and receive the next one. If unsuccessful the pupil must place the same card in position for the next day.

If the children are absent they mark "ab" against the day they were absent; if the test is omitted, "om"; "ex" when they are excused, and "pr" when the time is spent in practice.

DIES BY CUTTING THROAT WITH SAFETY RAZOR BLADE

Regina, Sask., Sept. 10.—Bernhard Larson, M. L. A. for Milestone, died at Weyburn Saturday morning with a gash in his throat made by a safety razor blade. According to Dr. R. M. Mitchell, superintendent of the Weyburn Mental Hospital, overwork and a nervous breakdown was the cause.

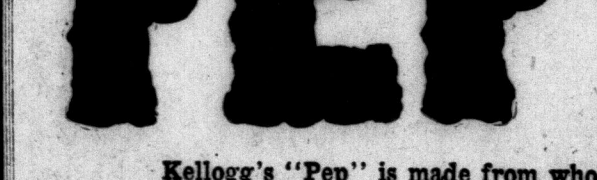
