Montreal, Oct. 29.—That the world's champion Canadians and New York's Saskatoon professional hockey team may play an exhibition game here before the opening of the National Hockey League season, Nov. 23, became probable today, when it was announced that there was every possibility of having artificial ice ready in the new Forum by Nov. 27.

Leo Dandurand has been arranging for a series of exhibition games over a circuit, including Grimsby, Stratford, London and possibly Niagara Falls and Hamilton. It was hoped to have the teams finish the series in Montreal, but for a time it appeared that ice would not be ready until the date set for the opening of the N. H. L. series.

GUELPH ROAD RACE CLAIMING ATTENTION

Big Program Arranged by Royal City For Thanksgiving Day.

Guelph, Oct. 29.—The Guelph cross-country run and road race association is again to the fore with a big program of road races to be held on Thanksgiving Day, Nov. 10.

There are four open races, and not less than six prizes will be awarded for each race. Over \$1,000 worth of prizes are offered, all of which have been donated by the citizens of Guelph. It is not a money-making venture, but simply an effort to stimulate road racing and to give a day of first-class sport. Last year a large number of officials and spectators from out of the city were present, and were high in their praise of the clean sport afforded and of the management of the races.

The open events include fifteen-mile run, ten-mile walk (handicap), five-mile run, and a mile cross-country run. Entries close Nov. 5.

WESTERN FAIR BOARD LOWERS \$8,000 DEFICIT

Total Revenue Is \$95,000—Weatherman Cheats Exhibition of Surplus.

Although the financial report of the Western Fair association for this year will show a deficit of from \$3,000 to \$5,000, the net deficit from 1923 will be cut down several thousand dollars incomplete reports received at the fair office indicate.

Last year the fair board was behind over \$8,000, due to contractors for work on the new manufacturers' building. These men have been paid out of this year's revenue, and had the weatherman given the fair a square deal there is more than a possibility that the exhibition would have shown a surplus.

The total revenue received this year to date is \$95,000, with a few grants still to be received. Secretary Jackson said that a complete report would not be available until after the auditors had gone over the books.

Mr. Jackson also stated that it was doubtful if there would be another meeting this year of the fair board. The annual meeting will be held next February.
