London Pupils Make Fine Show In Entrance Exams; Many Passed With Honors

Of 795 Pupils Who Sat For Papers, 663 Were Successful, While 171 Passed Departmental Examinations—Pass Percentage Higher Than Last Year.

London public schools have made an exceptionally fine showing in the entrance examinations this year. Of the 795 who sat for the papers, 663 were successful, or 83.4 per cent gained standing on their year's work, and the principals' recommendation, while 171 passed the departmental examinations. The percentage of successful candidates is higher than last year.

In the city of London junior matriculation courses are provided at the Collegiate Institute and the Technical High School. Teachers' courses are provided at the Collegiate Institute. Commercial courses are provided at the commercial department of the Technical High School. Parents and students should consult the principals of public and separate schools or principals of collegiate institutes and technical high schools in due time before the re-opening of school in order that the student may pursue in such case a course for which he or she is best suited.

In case any candidate wishes to make appeal, the candidate is urged to first consult the principal as to the advisability of entering such appeal. All appeals should be made to V. K. Greer, secretary of the high school entrance board, board of education offices, London, not later than August 15. The regulations of the department of education require that a \$2 fee be sent with each appeal. If the appeal is successful, the fee is returned; if not, it is retained by the board of education.

High school certificates will be mailed to successful candidates in the course of a few days. This certificate entitles the holder to attendance at any collegiate institute or technical high school in Ontario. The medalist of the city schools will be announced in the press when the premier year of the year has been decided upon. This is usually some time in the beginning of August.
