# **WILL HOLD INQUEST** INTO INDIAN'S DEATH

Sister of Dead Man Was Last To See Him At Midnight Saturday.

Special to The Advertiser. Brantford, July 9 .- A jury empanneled by Dr. C. C. Fissette, coroner to inquire into the circumstances surrounding the death of James Webster, the young Indian, whose body was found decapitated on the Mohawk Institute property, near the Canada glue works, on Sunday morning, viewed the remains of the

deceased at Beckett's undertaking parlors at 11:30 o'clock this morning. Adjournment was made until 8 o'clock next Monday evening.
According to Mrs. Jamieson, a sister of the dead man, Webster had been visiting her home on Saturday evening, departing about midnight That was the last seen of the Indian until his body was discovered by W. Johnson, a glue factory employee, proceeding to work on Sunday morning. In addition to his head and arm being discovered at varying distances of five and twenty feet from the body,

Of the 795 who sat for the papers, 663 were successful, or 83.4 per cent gained standing on their year's work, and the principals' recommendation, while 171 passed the departmental examinations. This certifi-eate entitles the holder to attendance at any collegiate institute or technical high school in Ontario. The medalist of the city schools will be announced in the press when the premier pupil of the year has been decided upon. This is usually some time in the beginning of August.
