Special to The Advertiser. Toronto, Oct. 23 .- Stressing the very real danger of the demand for lectrical power in Ontario becoming greater than the supply—a demand which, according to the present indications might easily make itself felt inside the next five years—Sir Adam Beck told The Advertiser today that the hydro commission has plans under consideration calling for the construction of steam plants for the generation of electricity and the production of power in those parts of the province where the need seems most PROVIDES DISCUSSION mminent.

"A power scarcity in Ontario would be a very serious thing," he declared. "It is true that at the present time no such scarcity exists, but if the nand continues to increase the way demand continues to increase the way

"After careful consideration I have come to the conclusion that steam generated electricity must be called into use." Sir Adam pointed out that with the generation of power by steam certain by products of a valuable nature, such as gas, coke, and coal substitutes of various kinds and other coal tar products would be made available. He said that he has been particularly impressed with the possibilities of using steam as the result of a recent trip of inspection which he had made
