**MYSERIOUS DEATH AT COWICHAN.**—On Saturday last a drowning case, the circumstances attending which are wrapped in mystery transpired at Cowichan. On Friday evening, a man named Clark—a stout, able-bodied fellow, well known in the district, but, we believe, following the pursuit of a goldminer when at Caicoo—called at a settler's house to borrow a flourbag, remarking that he wished "to put something into it." The settler, little imagining the tragic purpose, the bag was destined to serve, loaned it, and Clark, who appeared in good humor, walked away. The next morning, early, some person walking on Harris' wharf, observed a pair of boots sticking, sole-up, out of the water. A closer examination revealed the fact that the boots formed part of the apparel of a man, the upper part of whose body was under water. A boat was procured and the remains brought ashore, when it was found that the head of the person was encased in the identical flourbag. Clark had borrowed the bag the evening before. Upon removing the bag, which was tied tightly about the neck of deceased, the remains were recognized as those of Clark. Between the bottom of the sack and the dead man's head was found a large stone, which had served as a weight to sink the body head down. Coronor's inquest was held by Mr. Morley, J. P., but not the right evidence was adduced to show what means deceased came to his death, and a verdict of "found drowned" was reluctantly returned. It is possible that foul play caused the death; but the theory generally accepted is that Clark borrowed the bag to assist him in committing suicide, that he placed the stone in the bag, pulled the latter over his head, tying it securely about his neck, and then took a "header" into the harbor. The true facts of the case may ever remain a profound mystery.

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**AN ALLEGED SWINDLER ABROAD.**—We have received from San Francisco a letter and an extract from a public journal, which purport to give a sketch of the history of a bigamist, forger and confidence man, who has operated for several years in different States of the Union and in Canada with varied success, and who, the writer (we think, correctly) presume to be now in Victoria or on Puget Sound. He was first known in Indiana, as Frank G. Wilson; under which name he married in 1864 a young lady named Chase, by whom he has two children. Deserting his wife he turned up in St. Louis with another name and another woman to whom he was legally married. Arrested for bigamy, he gave the name of Frank W. Emerson; obtaining bail he fled addled to Worcester, Mass., leaving his bondsman to pay a forfeit of \$3000. At Worcester he appeared as B. F. Fitzgerald, in which name he was sent out as California agent for the Union Mutual Life Insurance Company. He was highly successful in obtaining insurance, which he forwarded promptly home; but always forgot to remit the premium. Finally an agent was sent out to look after him, who found him living in style with his second wife in a house of ill-fame, cutting a dash upon the company's money. He failed to make restitution, and was relieved from further service. He subsequently joined the Atma Life Insurance Company for a couple of weeks and was then discharged. About this time his antecedents became known at San Francisco, and he thought he would try and interest the parties to whom he presumed were the ones posted, so he went to Sacramento on the General Manager of the Atma Life Insurance Company in San Francisco for several hundred dollars, and after getting it cashed he started overland with his wife, Atabell, and an adopted child, to Portland, Oregon. They remained at Portland, Oregon, for a few days, and then took passage by the Adair for this city, arriving here a day or two ago—if the description furnished does not lead us astray—under the name of H. G. Wright, wife and child. Soon after his arrival he introduced himself to the American Consul and to Mr. Layton, U. S. Special Agent in this city, and from the last named gentleman received an appointment as special revenue detective and was detailed for duty on the steamer Wilson G. Hunt. He left here on Wednesday last on that steamer and it is said his instructions were "to search every trunk on board for smuggled goods." If Mr. Whatshisname be the character we are led to believe, there are few people who would care to have him search their trunks under any pretext. So soon as it became known that the new detective was a fugitive from justice, a messenger was despatched to Port Townsend with instructions to arrest and hold Wright until a requisition can be obtained from the States in which his most serious crimes are alleged to have been committed.
