REPORT ON REDISTRIBUTION OF WARDS

Aldermen Spent Much Valuable
Time in Debate With Mrs.
Drosdevitch.

(From Wednesday's Daily.)

A very lengthy session marked the regular meeting of the city council last evening. The greater part of an hour was occupied listening to Mrs. Drosdevitch's report on the redistribution of wards. The report was not torn down according to the report of the inspectors. The North Ward park caused much discussion in which some very lengthy addresses were made and many jokes passed by the aldermen. The long discussion on this question made an extension of time necessary and 15 minutes were granted. Another 5 minutes was voted for the assessment by-law and the consideration of the various sections was in progress, when Ald. Vincent drew attention to the fact that the by-law was not yet adopted. It was submitted this year and that it was a mistake to railroad it through on such short notice. It was decided to hold a special meeting to discuss the question fully. Before taking up the regular routine business it was decided to hear what.

Mrs. Drosdevitch had to say regarding the premises on Pandora street, and finally the report of the inspector's condemning buildings was adopted.

Taking up the regular business a communication was received from C. Sivert, secretary of the Trades and Labor council, acknowledging the appointment of a committee from the council to act as a reception committee at the meeting of the Trades and Labor congress. Received and filed.

A. T. Goward, local manager of the B. C. Electric Railway company, asked permission to have a permanent sidewalk on the corner of Langley and Fort streets. Carried.

Miss Carr, secretary of the Teachers institute thanked the board for the assistance received. Received and filed.

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Mr. Rose, secretary of the Victoria Young Men's Christian association, stated that he wished a reduction. The writer was informed that it is too late to deal with the question this year.

The city assessor presented the following report which was laid on the table.

Gentlemen—in accordance with your resolution of the 18th instant, I have divided the city into five wards, each having, as near as may be, an equal value, according to the last revised assessment. The division is as follows:

No. 1. Commencing at the public landing at the foot of Yates street, thence easterly along the easterly side of Yates street, and northerly along Government street to Queens avenue, thence easterly along Queens avenue to Douglas street, and northerly along Douglas street to the city boundary, thence westerly, southerly and easterly along the city boundary and shore line to point of commencement.

No. 2. Commencing at the junction of Yates and Government streets, thence along the easterly side of Yates street to the city boundary line, thence easterly along city boundary line as far as the northwestern corner of block 1, thence southerly along the easterly side of section 4 to Bay street, thence westerly along Bay street, thence southerly along Pandora street to Quadra street, and thence westerly along Yates street to point of commencement.

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The area, population and voting strength are, in my opinion, approximately, about equal.

Map, painted to show the various wards, accompanies this report.

Petition for Sidewalk

A petition was received from E. White and others, residing on Dunedin street and R. Hall and 32 others on the same street, requesting that a permanent sidewalk be laid and that the street be graded and extended through to Saanich road. Referred to the

street, sewers and bridges committee.

W. S. Beckwith and others requested that an electric light be placed at the corner of Prior street and Hillside avenue. Referred to the electric light committee.

Dr. Morrison, D. McMillan and Wm. N. Brown, presented a petition against a permanent sidewalk being laid on Quadra street between Fort and Kane street, giving as a reason that it would entail the expense of moving their building.

The committee stated that the building encroached on Quadra street and he was of the opinion that something should be done to make everyone get on the correct street line.

It is the opinion that if a building was erected on the street that it would be hard to have them removed and there was nothing in the act to prevent anyone from building on the street. The protest was not granted.

The finance committee recommended that the sum of \$100 be voted to defray the expense of the Victoria City Auditor's report on the audit of the city accounts.

The committee presented accounts amounting to \$9,780 which were received and ordered paid.

The finance committee recommended that an additional \$500 be expended on the Dallas road embankment.

Ald. Vincent pointed out that the council had voted to have the work completed and the money had been paid, and if the work was not done, it might mean the expenditure of double that amount. The report was adopted.

The Finance Committee presented the following report:

Dear Sirs—Your finance committee beg to recommend as follows:

That the sum of \$388.50 standing at the credit of the city treasury, be transferred to the credit of vote No. 34, streets, bridges and sidewalks, retaining value.

That warrant No. 7419, dated March 1906, appropriating \$1,000 to vote No. 34, streets, bridges and sidewalks, be cancelled, and the sum of \$615.50 be transferred to the credit of vote No. 34, streets, bridges and sidewalks, retaining value.

That the balance of \$388.50 together with the sum of \$615.50 be transferred to the credit of vote No. 34, streets, bridges and sidewalks, retaining value.
