### REDUCED FARES TO NEW YORK

### WAR PREPARATIONS BEING RUSHED

Balkan Peninsula is now an Armed Camp, Ready for Immediate War.

#### FIGHTING REPORTED

London, Oct. 2.—The whole of the Balkan peninsula is being rapidly transformed into an armed camp. According to despatches from the capitals of the various states, upwards of a million men have been ordered to gather to decide once for all, in a trial by combat, the question of changing the conditions of the inhabitants of the European provinces of Turkey.

The effect of a demonstration of the military forces of the four Balkan states is first to be tried. For this purpose Bulgaria, Serbia, Greece and Montenegro have ordered the mobilization of their entire available armies, and if this open threat does not secure what they demand from the Ottoman government, the next few hours may see further steps taken.

The four states of the new Balkan alliance are rapidly organizing to act together in arms for the first time against the common enemy—Turkey. The Ottoman authorities are no less busy, while it is seen from despatches from Vienna that Austria will find it impossible much longer to refrain from taking military precautions in order to keep the Servians from encroaching on territory which Austria-Hungary insists must remain part of Turkey and not become an adjunct of Greater Serbia.

#### SOME FIGHTING REPORTED

An untoward incident will undoubtedly start a general conflagration according to the prevailing opinion in diplomatic circles here, and the great powers might easily be drawn into this.

From some European capitals reports have reached here that men have crossed the frontiers and begun fighting, but these entirely lack confirmation.

It is likely that the reports are based on some of these clashes between frontier guards, which have been a daily occurrence in recent months. The only bright prospect in the situation is the Balkan states seem inclined to give the great powers a little more time in which to try to induce Turkey to introduce the reforms demanded in Macedonia.

It is reported to-day that they intend to send a collective note to Turkey explaining the reasons for their action in mobilizing their armies. As they necessarily must await a reply to this note the ambassadors of the great powers in Constantinople will be able further to impress the Porte with the advisability of granting their demands. The Porte must in the meantime, however, deal with two notes, both of which are practically ultimatums. One of these is from Serbia, and demands the release of Serbia ammunition which has been detained in transit through Turkey, while the other is from Greece, and protests against the detention of Greek shipping, which Turkey has decided to hold up and utilize for the transport of her troops.

The time for the reply to the Serbian note does not expire until to-night, so that even in this connection the ambassadors of the great powers have a full day before them in which to press upon the Porte the advice of their respective foreign offices.

For the present, however, preparations are proceeding on all sides for war. According to a private telegram received this morning in London, the mobilization of the Turkish army in Roumania, which included all the troops in Macedonia, besides those in Anatolia or Asia Minor, has already begun, so that the Balkan kingdom have very little start of her.

Turkey is also looking to Roumania to throw in her lot with the Ottoman troops, in which case Bulgaria would find herself sandwiched

between formidable foes and might be crushed.

It is also conceivable, according to opinions expressed in well informed quarters here, that the Albanians, forgetting their grievances against the Ottoman empire, might assist the troops against which they have been so recently fighting.

With their army in a high state of efficiency, and with the assistance of the Roumanians and the Albanians, prominent Turks believed they could defeat all their opponents in details or hold them off until they are worn out financially.

The smaller states, however, have long been preparing for the present moment, and have, it is said, plans by means of which they are confident they could more than hold their own.

They have certainly staked their all on the venture, for it is pointed out, even the mobilization of their armies is a very heavy drain on countries with such small resources.

As for Greece, the detention of her shipping by Turkey means, it is argued, almost bankruptcy. The stock exchange here again marked down all speculative stocks at the opening this morning from fear of further unfavorable news, but the absence of an actual outbreak of hostilities soon created a better feeling.

#### TURKEY CALLS OUT ALL TROOPS

Constantinople, Oct. 2.—Orders were issued by the Turkish war ministry this morning for the general mobilization of all the forces in both Europe and Asia. The Turkish press is absolutely unanimous in support of the government. The newspapers urge the ministers to face the foreign foes threatening the empire, and ask them not to be intimidated by the odds confronting the country. They declare that the Turkish army would be glad of a opportunity to avenge those who fell at the Shipka Pass in the Russo-Turkish war of 1877-78.

Cetteing, Montenegro, Oct. 2.—King Nicholas addressed a large crowd of Montenegrans in front of the palace last night exhorting the people to be patient and pointing out to them that the mobilization of the army did not mean war. The Turkish legation here is guarded by police.

Vienna, Austria, Oct. 2.—Emperor Francis Joseph today visited King George at his hotel, and spent three-quarters of an hour with him. Their Majesties greeted each other heartily. The Emperor was loudly cheered as he drove to the hotel.

London, Oct. 2.—The Greek government today purchased four torpedo boats under construction on Messier for the Argentine government. One of the vessels is ready to sail and the others are to be finished in a few days.

#### INDIA FAVORS TURKEY

Calcutta, Oct. 2.—Special prayers for the Sultan of Turkey are being offered to-day in all Mosques of India. The bazaars threaten to boycott all Greek goods.

London, Oct. 2.—A despatch from Sofia to the Exchange Telegraph Company, says that Bulgaria, Greece, Serbia and Montenegro have presented an ultimatum to Turkey, demanding reforms in Macedonia. The ultimatum will expire in 48 hours. No confirmation of this statement has been received from any source.

Paris, Oct. 2.—A telegram from Sofia states that 15,000 Macedonians are about to return from America as volunteer soldiers in the expected Balkan war.

### NEGRO LYNCHED BY CONVICTS

Rawlins, Wyo. Oct. 4.—Convicts at the Wyoming State Prison yesterday lynched Frank Wigfal, a negro and ex-convict, who late Tuesday night was put in the State institution for safe keeping. Wigfal was arrested on a charge of attacking Mrs. Ester Higgins, aged 78 last Sunday.

Wigfal was arrested at Fort Steele, 15 miles from here. Mrs. Higgins, the aged victim of the negro's attack lived near the state penitentiary and was a favorite with the prisoners.

Tuesday night a mob gathered and made an unsuccessful attempt to take Wigfal from the county jail. Fearing that the mob might return later, the officers reported to Governor Carey at Cheyenne, and received orders to transfer the negro to the State prison.
