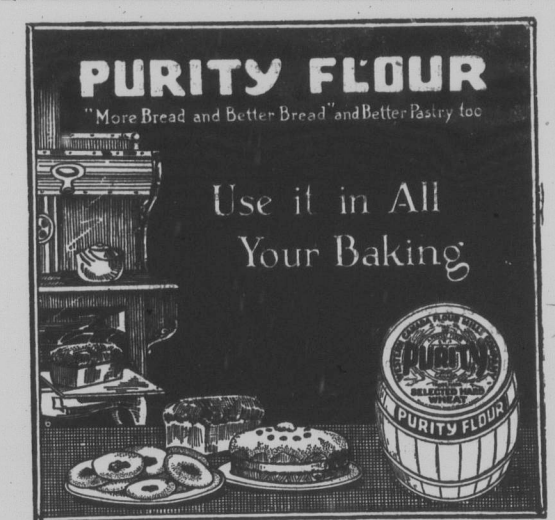


**TROUT FISHERS ARE NOW IN POLICE NET**

**EASTERN STEAMSHIP LINES RESUME SERVICE BETWEEN ST. JOHN AND BOSTON**

The resumption of service on the International Line between St. John and Boston on May 24, marks the opening of the service for the summer season for both passengers and freight.

The passenger service is particularly attractive, and it is anticipated that travel will be unusually heavy during the coming summer season. The popular Steamship Governor Dingley will leave St. John every Wednesday morning at 8 a.m. and every Saturday night at 6 p.m. (Atlantic Time). The Wednesday trips will be via Eastport and Lubec, while the Saturday evening trips will be to Boston direct.

The Steamship Governor Dingley has been thoroughly overhauled and refitted, being equipped with oil fuel. The trip from St. John to Boston will be one of pleasure as the discomfort which often arises from cinders is now entirely removed. The staterooms are large and commodious, well ventilated and the meals served are of the best products that the market affords.

For the expeditious transportation and handling of freight, this line will render the best possible service to Boston, where connection is made with the Metropolitan Line express steamers for New York via the Cape Cod Canal. This line has special facilities for the transportation of automobiles, horses and express freight.

**THE TOURIST CONVENTION.**

The New Brunswick Tourist and Resources Association have completed arrangements for the annual meeting, which will be held at Edmundston on Tuesday, June 6. A special Pullman will leave this city on Monday at 7:50 a.m. daylight time, over the C. P. R. and the representatives will arrive at Edmundston at 5:50 in the evening. Dinner will be served immediately at the hotel for the delegates and also for the members of the Canadian Weekly Newspaper Association, who will arrive at Edmundston on the same day. The delegates will be specially entertained on Monday evening and the business of the association will be transacted on Tuesday. A special Pullman will leave Edmundston on Tuesday evening over the C. N. R., arriving in St. John at 12:45 a.m. on Wednesday. Representatives from every county in the province are expected at the annual meeting.—Telegraph.

**THE GRADE BULL.**

Before discussing the merits of the Grade Bull, it might be best to answer the question: "What is a Grade Bull?"

Speaking correctly a grade is one that has one parent pure-bred, the other a mixture.

We all know that grades may be bred up to such a high standard that they may serve the same working purpose as pure-breds, however they are not generally as reliable breeders.

Many men argue that their grades are as good as the other fellow's pure-bred. This, in many instances, is true, but the owner of good grades must bear in mind that his good grades are good because of the pure-bred ancestors. The more pure-bred ancestors the grade has, the better the grade will be. The credit however for the good grade must be given to the pure-bred animal, because, NO MATTER HOW HIGHLY BREED THE GRADE IS WE CAN NEVER DEPEND ON HIM LIKE WE CAN ON THE PURE BREED.

There is back in his ancestry the impure mixture that is very liable to crop up at any time, hence the reason for using exclusively the pure-bred sire.

From the above it can readily be seen that it is mighty poor economy to use a grade sire in order to save a paltry service fee of \$2.00 or so. When a farmer has say only five cows to be bred, if he uses his community Bull Club pure-bred sire, his total fees would range around ten dollars. If on the other hand, he keeps a grade sire for breeding purposes, the latter's cost of maintenance would run the total fees away up over fifty dollars. Besides this he does not get from the grade sire as good a quality of calves as he would get from the use of the pure-bred.

This is a serious matter Mr. Farmer, and the question remains with you. WHAT ARE YOU GOING TO DO?

Ernest McEachern, who struck Michael over the head with a club, was arrested at the time of the trouble and has been held since in Richibucto jail pending the result of Michael's injuries. Tomorrow an inquest will be convened at which a verdict will be returned as to how Michael was killed.

**LOOT FROM THE RUSSIAN CHURCHES**

Diamonds, Pearls, Gold and Silver in Monasteries and Churches Confiscated.

Moscow, May 15—Silver by the ton, gold by the hundred weight, pearls by the bushel, and diamonds by the peck, dumped into wooden boxes, jute sacks, pasteboard cartons or merely wrapped in parcels, all this treasure hoard awaits opening and sorting at the storehouse for valuables confiscated by the Soviet government from the churches and synagogues of Russia for the benefit of the famine sufferers.

The correspondent of the Associated Press was permitted to visit the five story loft building which constitutes the warehouse, by consent of M. Kalinin, peasant president of Russia and head of all the famine relief.

One floor of the building, about one hundred feet long and 45 feet wide, is already nearly filled with the articles confiscated in Moscow alone, these amounting to more than 90,000 pounds of silver, several hundred pounds of gold and over 10,000 precious stones, mostly diamonds. Requisitioned articles from the provincial churches are to be stored on the other floors.

Each of the 624 packages in these big rooms is sealed, and they are stacked in tiers reaching almost to the ceiling. The yield from some of the monasteries was too large for a single package, overflowing into the smaller boxes stacked beside them.

A rough list of the articles confiscated accompanies each box as it is brought, under heavy guard, to the storehouse, but the exact value only will be known when appraisers open the packages and sort their contents.

Motor trucks fairly bristling with bayonets of the soldiers drive up to the treasure house all through the day and night, bringing boxes from the churches. From the outer gates to the roof, the building swarms with treasures are stored, and where soldiers. To get permission to enter it at all, one must first visit another building, where some other state officers even previous pedestrians from walking on the side of the street on which the building fronts.

**PREPARING FOR BRIDGE OPENING**

Gala Event Will be Formal Opening of International Bridge at Edmundston.

Edmundston, May 12—A meeting was held this week between the committee of the Board of Trade and the Committee appointed by the town council to make arrangements for the opening of the International Bridge. It is not certain yet when the bridge will be turned over by the contractors, but it is hoped that it will be possible to have the opening by the 1st of July, as has already been reported in these columns. Madawaska, Me., the village on the other side of the bridge, is entering into the arrangements and it will be a joint celebration. The town council, and Board of Trade Committee have entered enthusiastically into the arrangements and the success of the day is assured.

**ONE MILLION FEET OF LUMBER BURNED**

One million feet of pine lumber on Bay du Vin Island, the property of Mr. T. B. Williston, was destroyed by fire Wednesday night, insured for \$33,000, the world says. Mr. Williston was offered a much larger price for it before the drop in the price of lumber, but held it for a rise.—Chatham World.
