A Fredericton Girl Abroad.

"Wednesday afternoon, about six o'clock  
came the Benmor Whig of Saturday, Mrs. P.  
G. White, who for some time has not been  
living with her husband, called at the board-

Barnard street, and called for Miss McCarthy,  
a dressmaker, who was boarding there.

The woman immediately came down into the  
parlor, and after a few preliminary remarks  
she was accused by Mrs. White of being in-  
imate with the latter's husband, and Mrs.

other woman and fired. She failed

The St. John Election.

When the City convention met in St.  
John to nominate Mr. McLeod, they passed  
a resolution urging the party to unite in

ernment. If the St. John party are able and  
willing to elect a man whose course will re-  
semble that of the late Mr. Burpee, they will  
be the first or last part of his parliamentary life,  
they will have a representative who can par-  
ticipate with Mr. Weldon.
