The Footwalk For Employes.

After the needlebeams are laid a flood of cement is put in between the end of the timbers and the wall of the tunnel on each side, to keep the track in place, and to make a footwalk for the employes. Then on top of the needlebeams are spiked the ponderous rails, 100 pounds to the yard and 30 feet long, and the track is complete. In the roof are placed suction pipes communicating with the pumping station, by which the air is pumped out and twentilation is secured; and at intervals along the walls safety ladders like small fire escapes are built into the tunnel, on which the track walker may take refuge when he chances to meet a train. This work is all well advanced, and when it is finished and the electric light wires put up and proper lamps attached the tunnel fissif will be complete and ready for business.
