R. Wilson-Smith of Montreal, the Success ful Tenderer of Last Fall, Makes the Offer-Mayor Kennedy Has Received the Tender But Will Not Make Its Contents Known.

Montreal, June 11 .- "I have just wired a tender to Mayor Kennedy for the Toronto bonds, and I am prepared to take delivery and pay for them right here, and as quickly as the transaction can be closed." These were the words which greeted The World correspondent this afternoon, when Ald. R. Wilson Smith was called upon at his banking office. Notre

I am not prepared to say just now, as it would be at least discourteous to His Worship to give out the price be-fore he has received my despatch. Continuing, Ald. Smith said, "I am Continuing, Ald. Smith said, "I am really astonished at the action being pur-sued with reference to the sale of these Toronto bonds. You will remember that last October tenders were called for them and mine being the highest was accepted by the Executive Committee, although the Edinburgh firm got every opportunity of beating it in competition. My tender was accepted, but subsequently, and chiefly, on the ground that it was more in the interest of the city to issue four per-cents, the council decided to await legiss-lation to authorize such issue.-"Now," concluded the Montreal banker, " such legislation being secured, it seems passing strange that they should issue 3 1-2 per cents and not give Cana-dians an opportunity of tendering for them. However, as I just told you, my tender is by this time in Mayor Kenne-dy's hands."

What the Mayor Says. A World reporter saw His Worship last night respecting the above despatch. Mayor Kennedy said he had received the offer referred to, but he regarded it as a confidential one. Except with the con-sent of Ald. Smith, to whom he had written in response, the terms of the offer would not be made public. "Is it as good as the offer of the Edin-burgh firm?" the reporter asked. "Quite as good, if not better; but, as I have said, I do not feel justified in di-vulging the terms."

He had not changed his attitude one lota as to the inadvisability of Mr. Coady go-ing to England to transact business which could as well be done here. Why should the city wish to deal with Edinburgh or London firms, when as good terms could be secured in the open market and Canadian houses have an equal chance?
