they gave him a great deal of ill ufage, and obliged him to embark, all fick as he was, and deftitute of neceffaries, on board of one of the fhips of the fquadron, in which he was conveyed to England, from whence he at length got to France *.

The fame year, 1745, feveral bodies of the favages, deceafed, and buried at *Port Tholouze*, were dug up again by the Boftoners, and thrown into the fire. The burying-place of the favages was demolifhed, and all the croffes, planted on the graves, broke into a thoufand pieces.

In 1746, fome ftuffs that the favages had bought of the English, who then traded in the bay of Megagouetch at *Beau-baffin*, there being at that time a great fcarcity of goods over all the country, were found to be *poifoned* +, fo that more
