THE LATE MAJOR WELSFORD.—The following letter was written by this late lamented officer within an hour of his being blown to atoms from the cannon's mouth:—

"Camp, Sept. 8. My dear B.— This is about to be an eventful day to some of us, as we are to storm the Redan, the French the Malakoff; and, as you say, 'would it were bed time, Hal, and all were well.' But I trust in Providence all will be well, and that I will be instrumental in making her Majesty's present of the Redan, and us I am to lead the Light Division storming party, and, if God spares me, to be the first in and first up. This is to be done by escalade. I am glad her Majesty has seen my photographs, and I now send you some more like them.— No time for writing more, as the drums are going. Remember me to Lady —. They asked me if I liked the idea of active service, I will tell them more about it when this day is over. God bless you my dear B.— Believe me truly yours, A. F. WELSFORD."

H. M. BESSEY, 70, Capt. Granville, bearing the flag of Rear Admiral Arthur Fanshawe, C. B., sailed for Bermuda and the southern portion of his command yesterday.

PLASTER COVE, Nov. 1st, 1853.—Capt. Kirby, Collector of Light Duty in the Strait of Cano, was drowned this afternoon in getting over the ship's side into the boat which was alongside. POSTPONED SALE OF SHEEP.

SALE OF STALLIONS & DURHAM HEIFER.

THE Sale of SHEEP at Halifax, advertised for the 13th instant, is Postponed to TUESDAY the 26th instant, at twelve o'clock at noon, when it will take place on the Grand Parade.

At same time and place will be Sold the following Animals, imported from Canada, and purchased by the Government for the use of the Province, viz.:

A Brown STALLION, 6 years old, of pure Canadian or Norman blood.

A Grey STALLION, 3 years old, of the same breed.

A Black STALLION, of the Cleveland breed, 4 years old, half brother to the grey horse of the same breed recently imported by the Province.

A DURHAM HEIFER, 3 years old, of pure blood. The Sheep and Heifer will be sold under bonds, of which the condition will be that they be kept respectively for two years at least within the province for the purpose of propagation.

The condition of the Bonds under which the Stallions will be sold, will be, that they shall be retained in the Province for eight years, and be kept in some part thereof in good faith, as covering Stallions, for the first four years after the purchase.
