Treaty No. 3

Government Obligations

100 acres a family of 50 persons for each single person over the age of 21 or single couple under the age of 21. Total cash payment at treaty \$100,000. Annual interest payment from proceeds of farm sales; same to be paid in those years when the estate is sold.

Land-Reservation on Reserves

August 27, 1871 - Chippewa and Ottawa Central Reservations, Commissioners of Indian Affairs and Secretary of War.

Area ceded 12,000 square miles.

To observe the treaty, certain persons not to select persons or property from among the reservation lands which additional undertakings to be taken by the Indian officers to be made.

Reserves, 100 acres a family of five and additional 25 acres more. Control of liquor traffic, maintenance of school on each reserve, commission to take census.

Triennially \$2,000, raised to \$3,000 in 1873; annuity \$5,000, less \$1,000 for interest paid on other bonds, chief and headman.

August 27, 1871 - Chippewa and Ottawa Central Reservations, Commissioners of Indian Affairs and Secretary of War.

Area ceded 12,000 square miles.

Reserves, 100 acres a family of five and school on each reserve; control of liquor traffic; commission to take census.

\$3,000 per capita raised to \$5,000 in 1873; annuity \$5,000, less \$1,000 for interest paid on other bonds, chief and headman (added in 1875).

October 1, 1872 - Sisseton tribe of the Upper Indians and others, northwest of central living west of the Great Lakes and entire portion of the Sisseton reservation.

Area ceded, 27,000 square miles.

Reserve to be one square mile to each family of five; school on reservation; right to sell with surplus on reserve; land, right to sell on reserve; lands with consent of the Secretary of War; reservation to be for the benefit of the Sisseton tribe; to be used for public purposes; to be used to compensate
