REQUEST THAT GOVERNMENT TAKE ACTION

Mr. Harvie Andre (Calgary Centre): Madam Speaker, as a result of the National Energy Program half of this country's petroleum drilling industry has left the country. Thousands of people have been laid off. Dozens of companies have gone into bankruptcy and receivership. Three hundred thousand barrels of Canadian production per day are shut in. Seventeen billion dollars of capital has fled the country as the result of the National Energy Program.

The government of Alberta has recognized something is wrong. It has moved to take action. It has taken some important initiatives. Will the federal government act as responsibly? That is the simple question.

Hon. Marc Lalonde (Minister of Energy, Mines and Resources): Madam Speaker, the government of Alberta has acted in response to a commitment it gave when we reached an agreement last September. The government of Alberta agreed to review its royalties. Alberta recognized that something had to be done with respect to its royalties, and I expect the government of Saskatchewan and the government of British Columbia will follow soon. What the government of Alberta has done had been to honour the commitment it made under the agreement.

In the meantime, we have gone even further than required under the agreement with regard to taking measures to reduce the amount of shut-in oil in Alberta and Saskatchewan by expanding the price for new oil to categories of oil which were not covered under the agreement. These are things we have done, and they have meant significant benefit to the industry. I invite my hon. friend to look at them.
