J. M. WARREN BUYS LARGE SAND PIT Will Manufacture Cement Bricks and Supply Sand to Builders.

EARLS COURT'S PROGRESS Thousand Dollars of Sidewalk Dumped into the Ravine.

Yesterday John M. Warren of the John M. Warren Co., 30 Vaughan road, purchased thru W. P. Ryan, five acres on Bathurst street, adjoining R. J. Fleming's property.

This land has an extensive sandpit, which will be worked and cement bricks will be manufactured on a large scale, thus providing employment for a number of hands.

The number of houses, stores, theatres, churches, etc. in course of erection equals that of any other district in the city, and during the business hours of the day that portion of St. Clair avenue embraced by the Earls-court and Oakwood section is a busy place.

The Dominion Bank and Canadian Bank of Commerce report steady progress, and all storekeepers report good business and are optimistic for the future.

A thriving aerated water factory, with a modern and up-to-date plant, established within the last 12 months, and by Manchester Brothers, distributes supplies to all parts of the city.

The large nurseries of Miller Bros. are too well known to need passing mention. Sufficient to say that two new greenhouses are at present being erected by this firm.

Side Walk Dumped. J. Dinwiddie, 28 Bracondale avenue, stated last night that about 1000 feet of recently laid sidewalk on Bracondale and Vaughan roads, has been torn up and dumped into the St. Clair ravine.

The estimated cost of this quantity of sidewalk is \$210 for 201 feet, or a total of considerably over \$1000.

"That is no lie," said Mr. Dinwiddie. "The engineering department, when laying out the road, graded it too low and the contractor bungled the job, and through their negligence 20 years ago on the boulevard, are surrounded by the cement sidewalk."

"When the occupants of the houses require to leave by the front door the road is now so low that it requires some considerable skill to negotiate the descent into the roadway."

"The end is not yet," he concluded. "The city will have to compensate me for this."

C. P. R. WANTS PAYMENT FOR WORK IN ADVANCE Refused City's Offer to Pay for Extra Excavation as It Proceeded.

It is believed that the four feet of roadway on the east side of the Yonge street C.P.R. subway will be excavated by the city as an 18-foot roadway is considered necessary on account of the heavy traffic at that point.

The C.P.R. held that a 14-foot roadway was sufficient, but the works department thought otherwise and informed the railway company of the decision.
