AUSTRIAN AMBASSADOR'S STATEMENT HAS ADDED TO GRAVITY OF SITUATION

WASHINGTON, Sept. 8.—Dr. Constantin Dumba, Austro-Hungarian ambassador, left late today for the summer embassy at Lenox Mass., to await word from Secretary of State Lansing as to whether the United States Government is satisfied with his explanation of his intercepted letter to the Vienna Foreign Office, outlining plans for withdrawing Austro-Hungarian labor and handicapping American plants manufacturing war supplies.

CADORNA IS ASSURED OF FINAL TRIUMPH

Italian Commander Expresses Full Confidence in Message to Joffre. PARIS, Sept. 8.—An official note issued today gives the reply of General Count Cadorna to the message sent him by General Joffre, the French commander-in-chief, after the latter's recent visit to the Italian front. Gen. Cadorna thanks Gen. Joffre for the honor of a visit, which he said had knit into closer unity "faith in the common ideal." The message concludes: "Beyond our common frontier, which does not separate but unites the forces and aspirations of our two countries, my thoughts and best wishes follow you to the French army, already crowned with victory; and I look forward with absolute certainty to the final success of the allied armies."

WILL EXTEND HYDRO SIXTY MORE MILES

Commission Ratifies New Lines at Various Points in Ontario. The construction of about 60 miles of new hydro transmission lines was authorized by the Ontario Hydro-Electric Commission at its meeting yesterday. One line is to run from Chatham thru Fergus to Oil City, another from Granby to Kirkton and Exeter, and still another from Lucan to Alisa Craig. The last mentioned will be the shortest, the distance being about 10 miles, while the other two are approximately 25 miles.

THREE FISHING VESSELS SUNK

LONDON, Sept. 8.—The British fishing vessels Emmanuel, Victorious and Constance have been sunk. Their crews were landed at Mulden, Holland.

GERMAN NOTE ON ARABIC'S DESTRUCTION NOW CLAIMS SELF-DEFENCE.

German Note on Arabic's Destruction Now Claims Self-Defence. The note reveals in detail the instructions to submarine commanders concerning their treatment of liners. They are ordered not to attack a passenger steamer except in case of an attempt to escape after it is ordered to halt, unless its actions indicate an intention to attack the submarine. (The claim of a right to sink a hostile passenger ship after the passengers and crew have been placed in boats presumably is not affected by these instructions.)
