

The other example to which reference is made above consists of a very remarkable document, so framed as to closely resemble some form of process issued by the Division Court. In reality it is nothing more or less than a notice issued by the collection department of a certain manufacturing company, but so skilfully has it been prepared that at first glance even the practiced eye is deceived. With the necessary omissions and substitutions, it stands confessed as follows:—

TAKE NOTICE that the above-named plaintiff claims you are indebted to them in the sum of Fifty Dollars, as shewn by their particulars of claim herewith following, that is to say, for note past due and costs thereon.

IT BEING FURTHER SET FORTH by the plaintiff that although duly and regularly demanded, the defendant has not made payment of the said claim.

NOW THEREFORE NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN to the above-named defendant that unless within fifteen days after the service hereof, that is to say, on or before the 10th day of January, A.D. 1912, at 2.30 o'clock P.M., you do appear in person for payment of said claim, or otherwise make provision for satisfactory adjustment and settlement thereof, action will be entered in Court and suit brought against the above-named defendant for recovery of the total amount, together with the costs and disbursements of the said action or actions as may be necessary.

The skeleton form of this notice is printed on white paper of foolscap size, bearing a red marginal line. The words "Special Summons" are in red-ink letters nearly half an inch in height, and the memorandum at the foot of the notice is also in red. The words "Collection Dept. X Mfg. Co., etc.," occupy a modest position, as indicated, and are printed in very much finer type than appears elsewhere in the document. The signature of the "C. D. Clerk" is an actual signature, not a facsimile. Names,
