

## ROSEDALE BY 101 TO 91 DEFEAT TORONTO C. C.

Interesting League Cricket Match  
Decided on Varsity Lawn—Park-  
dale Win From Grace Church.

Rosedale and Toronto met on Saturday at Varsity lawn in the Toronto Cricket League, under ideal conditions. The game attracted a good number of enthusiasts and they were keenly watching a very keen struggle. The game eventually resulted in a victory for Rosedale by the narrow margin of ten runs.

Capt. Reid won the toss and put Toronto in to bat on a fast wicket. H. G. Davidson opened the innings for the home team to the bowling of H. G. Wootley and L. G. Black. Davidson was out at 2 being caught at cover-point by W. Swan, off Wootley. E. H. Leighton was out at the same total, making two wickets for nine runs. A. Beemer (5) and H. G. Davidson (4) made a stand for a time, but Black, who bowled magnificently, severely scolding down one loose ball, dismissed four batsmen in quick succession, making 6 wickets down for only 35 runs.

H. Lounsbrough, who played a very pretty and sound innings of 27 runs, with the aid of W. McCaffrey, 100, D. W. Saunders (5 not out) and S. Beatty (7), carried the total to 91 runs. Black, as before stated, bowled practically fourless, his figures being 13 over, 4 maidens, 20 runs, 7 wickets. H. G. Wootley, 12 over, 20 runs, 3 wickets. Rosedale, requiring 92 runs to win, started off with R. Nall and G. M. Baines. This pair gave the visitors a good start, putting on 29 runs for the first wicket, at which point Barnes was caught at the wicket off Rathbun for 8. R. Nall then joined Nall and by good batting they took the score to 57, when Nall was caught by Doherty off Rathbun. He had given the spectators quite a treat by his hand driving and cutting and was much applauded on returning. It was well for Rosedale that Captain H. S. Reid was in good form, as a collapse ensued before Rathbun's bowling, and only L. G. Black (10 not out) stayed long, the whole side being out in 32 runs. Reid played a very sound innings for 32 runs, his innings, like Lounsbrough's, being an object lesson in correct play to batsmen pitched on their legs or leg stump. Rathbun, after his first two overs, bowled very well and worked hard, but in the game for Toronto, his analysis being 14 over, 3 maidens, 42 runs, 4 wickets. A. Beemer was chief assistant, playing 14 over, 1 maiden, 22 runs, 3 wickets. The bowling and fielding all thru was very keen and that probably was the reason for the low scores on both sides. D. W.
