ARE THEY BLUFFING?

Preparations-More Officers and Men Sent Forward.

New York, July 16 .- The London correbeen signs of uneasiness in Downing-street this week over the continued preparation for war in South Africa. The Ministers are for war in South Africa. The Ministers are evidently bent upon making a show of fighting, even if they have no serious intention of repudiating the convention with the Transvaal, which pledges them not to interfere with the interpal affairs of that republic. They are sending out to the Cape to-day 30 officers and 320 men, and gun carriages and other war material are also shipped. The openness with which these warlike movements are conducted is suspicious, since secrecy is cordinarily observed before the dogs of war are let loose. The natural interence is that the Ministers are anxious to put on the screws and squeeze a few more concessions out of the Boer Government by menaces of hostilities.

Supported by the Press.

They are well supported by the press, which, with the exception of The Manchester Guardian and The Daily Chronicle, rejects the reform scheme at Pretoria as utterly inadequate, although it marks a decided advance upon President Kruger's proposals to Sir Alfred Milner. The press discussion, however, has a hollow sound; it does not seem credible that a moral country like England will commit a deliberate breach of treaty law and divide the White races of the Cape Colony by going to war with the Transvaal rather than to abate a single jot or tittle of Sir Alfred Milner's demand.

"The warriors of the press have been compelled this week to turn their guns upon the Schreiner Ministry, which is representative of the Government of the Cape Colony, and to bombard the stronghold of colonial constitutional power. That Ministry may have taken an optimistic view of the Boer concessions, but it has a clear majority of eight in the Assembly and one of 13 when the Independent are counted, and it cannot justly, be regarded as a minority faction representing Dutch feeling in the Cape Colony. It is true that Mr. Schreiner, in expressing approval of the Boer compromise, has gone outside the scope of the self-government of a single colony, and has meddled with Imperial interests. He does shot appear, however, to have done anything more, apart from the suzerainty theory, than the Canadian Premier has done in blocking the Alaska negotiations and taking full charge of Imperial interests in the American continent, and there has been no outcry in England against that form of meddlesome activity.
