COLONEL LEYS HAS RESIGNED A STRIKE OF CHARMKAMERS

London Papers Declare He Has Sent in His Resignation to Premier Ross. HIS CONSTITUENTS ARE ILL-TREATED.

Thames Fishing License Has Caused His Friends to Press Him Into Action.

London, April 19.—(Special)—Several hundred charmkammers went out on strike at noon today. At 5 o'clock this afternoon the strike was broken up. A scale of pay submitted to the manufacturers did not prove satisfactory. Mr. J. R. Tracy, fourth vice-president of the International Charmkammers' Union, arrived in London today to represent the strikers. The union is supporting the strike of the local workers. The International Union has a membership of over 40,000. The strike followed at once upon the arrival of the London papers, to the number of about 200, paraded the streets singing sentiments about non-union cigars.


