

ASK FIVE REPRESENTATIVES

Toronto Manufacturers Say Two Delegates to Technical School Board Not Enough.

OFFICERS AND COMMITTEE CHOSEN.

Representatives Are Also Selected to Serve on Executive Council.

Matters pertaining to the industries of Canada were discussed at the annual meeting of the Toronto branch of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association yesterday afternoon in their rooms at the Board of Trade Building. The retiring president, W. K. George, was in the chair, and over 100 members were present.

In the report of the chairman of the Executive Committee it was pointed out that the year just closed had been one of substantial progress, the membership having increased until now to 210. Two classes of questions were brought to the attention of the committee. First, those matters that affected them as manufacturers, and second, those that interested them only in their own capacity as citizens. In the first class, the committee acted in what it believed to be the best interest of its members, and in the second class it preferred to stand aloof and take no part in questions that affected them purely as citizens only. The committee recommended that the Executive Committee be increased to ten members, and that the past chairman of the local committee be ex-officio members.

**Want Bigger Representation.**  
The meeting was of the opinion that they should have a larger representation on the Technical School Board. Accordingly a resolution was passed that the present representation of two be increased to five. The new Executive Committee was instructed to present this resolution to the city council. Messrs. H. Vanderlinde of the Ottawa Percha Rubber Co. and Dr. J. O. Orr were appointed representatives to the Technical School Board.

A letter from Mr. J. O. Thora, manager of the Metallic Hoisting Co., on the technicality of the street car system, led to a long discussion. Mr. Thora thought it was about time that united and energetic action should be taken towards bringing about a much-needed improvement in the service.

A resolution was moved that the City Council take steps to compel the Street Railway Co. under the terms of their agreement, to provide a service commensurate with the needs of the city. The resolution was left over, and the latter was referred to the Executive Committee for consideration.

John Douglass, who took a hand in a murder, arrested in Alabama. Pottsville, Pa., Oct. 23.—Sheriff Beddall of Schuylkill County has received a telegram from P. H. Montgomery at Stone Mountain, Ala., stating that he has under arrest John Douglass, who has confessed that he helped to murder Alexander R. Ray, near Centerville, during the reign of the Magistrate in the antislavery region. Ray was a colliery superintendent, and was driven to his colliery in a carriage when he was set upon by Patrick Heister, McHugh and Tully, who were convicted of the murder and hanged.

CANADIAN SOCIETY YEAR BOOK.

The Year Book for 1901-1902 of the Canadian Society for 1901-1902, just received in Toronto, is an interesting little volume, made especially so from the important events of the past year, which have been recorded in the book. A full account is given of the speeches made at the annual dinner of May 24, 1901. Sir Percy Anderson speaking to the toast of "The Queen," whose demise was not then thought of, and Premier Borden of Ontario, for a verbatim report of the address pronounced by the chairman of the society, Rev. Arthur H. Judge, M. A. Among the honorary members of the association are the Earl of Minto, the Earl of Aberdeen and Sir Wilfrid Laurier, while Hon. G. A. Cox, Mr. William Macbabe, Mr. O. Ramsey, Mr. W. E. Watson and Mr. L. Goldman of Toronto are non-resident members. The financial report shows a balance on the right side and the society is in a flourishing condition.

Buffalo, N.Y., Oct. 23.—The three-masted schooner Paisley, from Erie, in ballast, ran on the Horseshoe Reef just outside the breakwater today, and it is believed will be a total loss. The crew were rescued. The vessel was owned by Captain Davidson, and was built in Bay City, Mich. in 1896. She rated 41, and had a valuation of \$35,000. She carried no insurance.

HOUSE USED FOR HOSPITAL.

Owners.

Four suits were disposed of in the Non-Jury Assize Court yesterday by Mr. Justice Meredith. On Aug. 23 last Cornelia, wife of Miss Clifton Dawson, fell on the sidewalk in front of the old Parliament Buildings, and hurt herself pretty badly. She sued the city, and the case was to have been tried yesterday, but was settled before trial.

The Sun Life Insurance Co. owns a large dwelling house on May-street, near the junction of the old Parliament Buildings. When smallpox was epidemic there in June, 1900, the company sued the city for damages because of repairs, and because the house couldn't be rented or sold. Judge Meredith awarded the company \$100 without costs.

George Lyons, on April 11, 1896, bought some land at Toronto Junction at a tax sale, paying \$13. The land belonged to John Jones and his wife Barbara, who gave a quit claim. Aug. 5, 1901, the Joneses made a mortgage to David Hinson of \$400 and \$275.30 interest, and Lyons got possession of the land. The defence denied liability. Judgment was reserved.

By an agreement, dated Jan. 30, 1901, the City of Toronto, Limited, contracted with John Long to sell him certain lands at North Toronto for a consideration of \$1000, of which \$200 was to be paid in cash and the balance to represent a mortgage on the property. Long is said to have failed to live up to the terms, and the result that the company rescinded the agreement. Hinson yesterday for specific performance of the contract, but his Lordship dismissed the action without costs.

PAID ACCOUNT WITH STOCK.

Suit to Recover Bill for Printing Reports Dismissed.

The Gold Hills Exploration & Development Company were the defendants in a suit brought by the Hunter, Rose & Co., Ltd., and tried in the County Court yesterday. It was to recover \$100 for printing 1500 annual reports, a like number of circulars and for supplying the company with stationery. The defence claimed that on Sept. 12, 1900, the plaintiffs allotted to Dan A. Rose, an agent of the company, the shares of the capital stock of the company in settlement of the account. Judge McKeown found that this was so, and dismissed the action with costs.

In the next case Timothy Murphy brought action against the London Life Assurance Co. to compel them to deliver to him a paid-up policy for \$200. Murphy has been paying for the policy for about five years. They dispute his claim, because they say he misrepresented his age when he obtained the policy from this insurance. The suit will be continued this morning.

The action brought against Dr. Constantine Bottger, superintendent of the Ottawa Hygienic Institute, by Charles E. Hasey of this city, to recover \$176.50 on a debt, was adjourned, and will probably be settled.

Discovered Fossil Remains.

Laramie, Wyo., Oct. 23.—Prof. C. W. Gilmore, in the employ of the Carnegie Museum at Pittsburgh, has discovered near Medicine Bow, 80 miles west of this place, the almost complete fossil remains of a mammoth, a very rare specimen and one of the largest ever found in the Southern Wyoming field. The remains will be unearthed and sent to Pittsburgh.

Left Life Insurance.

Charles Fraser, stationary engineer, who died last June, had made no will. His children have asked the Union Trust Co. to administer his estate, which consists of life insurance for \$1000.

GEN. BULLER IS NOW OUT.

His Notice of Dismissal Was Not Long in Being Obedied.  
London, Oct. 23.—The afternoon newspapers today agree that the dismissal of Gen. Buller from the command of the First Army Corps, which was announced yesterday evening, was inevitable. It appears that the notification was given to the official messenger from the War Office, at about the same time that it was issued to the newspapers. This morning's army orders at Aldershot announce that Gen. Buller has already given up his command.

The King, Brodick and Buller.  
New York, Oct. 23.—According to the London correspondent of The Tribune, the King has taken a great interest in the controversy about the Ladysmith heroism. Since Sir Redvers Buller made his famous speech at Balmoral to give His Majesty the War Office view of the affair, and the return of the court to London was marked by the official announcement that Sir Redvers had been relieved of the command of the First Army Corps.

He is said to have a net worth of \$1,000,000. He was born in China, and came to New York in 1870. He has a wife and three children. He is now 60 years old, and his health is good. He is said to be a very generous man, and he has been very successful in his business. He has made his money in the opium trade, and he has been very successful in his investments. DEAD MEN IN HOLY TERROR MINE.

With two other miners they had been working on the 1200-foot level, where they encountered foul air. They signalled to be drawn up, but the machinery suddenly failed to work, and it was impossible to get them out in time to save their lives.

New York, Oct. 23.—D. Colvin, the American agent of the Barum & Bailey Circus, died here today. In addition to his circus interests, he was the proprietor of the Bijou Theatre, Chicago.

THE MURDERS NOT CONFIRMED.

Washington Has No News of Killing of Miss Stone's Companions.

Washington, Oct. 23.—The State Department has heard nothing from any official source to confirm the Austrian reports of the killing of the brother of Madame Tullia by Turkish troops, or the death of the lady herself. Consul-General Dickinson has been extremely energetic in his efforts to stimulate the Turkish and Bulgarian governments to do their share toward the rescue of the captives, but he has been unable lately to communicate any reassuring advice.

Saratoff Escapes Himself.

Paris, Oct. 23.—M. Saratoff, the former president of the Macedonian Committee, has written a letter to The Times, dated from Paris, emphatically denying the reports that he is an accomplice in the assassination of Miss Ellen M. Stone, the American missionary. He says he has been living quietly in Paris for the past month.

WOMAN A PENSION SWINDLER.

Stout Falls, S.D., Oct. 23.—Mrs. Sarah J. Flynn of Lake Preston, S.D., who is highly respected and has been prominent in Woman's Relief Corps circles, pleaded guilty in the United States Court here this afternoon to an indictment, charging her with swindling for a pension on the widow of Silas J. Flynn, a New York veteran, who served during the Civil War. Flynn's widow, Mary C. Flynn, was granted a pension, and was a witness before the Grand Jury in the present case.

ANOTHER SUBMARINE DESTROYER

San Francisco, Oct. 23.—A model of a torpedo designed for use in warfare has been given a trial in the bay by the inventor, John P. Perkins, late of New Zealand. The trial was apparently satisfactory. The torpedo is intended for use as a submarine boat, as well as a conveyor of deadly explosive material. The inventor claims that it can be steered in any direction.

TO RUN FOR MAYOR.

London, Oct. 23.—The Duke of Marlborough has accepted the nomination to the Mayoralty of Westminster, and his action is pleasing to the Duchess, who has long wished political preference for her husband.

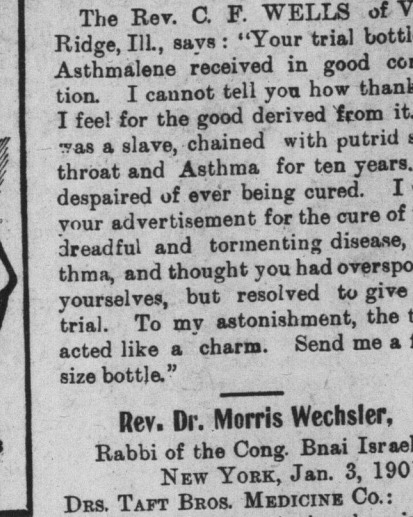
The Late Mr. Davin.

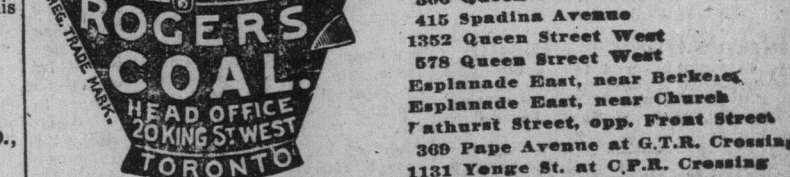
