NEW LOOP LINE SUGGESTED TO MITIGATE CONGESTION

City and T. R. C. Have Lines in View to Improve the Service.

Along Richmond-street, from York-street to Victoria-street, thence up Victoria-street to Shuter-street, with extensions to Yonge and Church-streets; this is the new street railway loop line which the city works committee will recommend to council as a means of mitigating the congestion of traffic around the corner of Queen and Yonge-streets. The plan as adopted by the committee does not exactly jibe with the General Manager Fleming's suggestion in a letter presented by Mr. Rust. Mr. Fleming's idea was for double tracks on Bay-street from Queen to Richmond, thence along Richmond to Church, with a line up Victoria-street, branching out, meeting tracks extending from Yonge-street to Church-street.

No Tracks on Bay. The committee was strongly opposed to tracks on Bay-street, since that thoroughfare is the only driveway up town from the Union Station. The street railway manager held out tempting bait. Seventy large double track cars were being rushed to completion, but could not be used unless there were more tracks in the centre of the city. The public were greatly inconvenienced by the present jostling via Front and Church-streets to Queen-street, and from Front and Station-streets, with return to Yonge, the street said. This handicapped rapid moving, and obstructed general traffic. Kings and Yonge-streets was not the passenger discharging point it had been. The extension of James-street thru to Richmond was suggested as an alternative idea that would suit the railway.

Mr. Fleming gave this insight into the company's policy: "The object of laying down these auxiliary lines is to enable the company to more conveniently deposit passengers during the day, and to remove the unnecessary large number of empty cars that travel down Yonge-street, south of Queen, at all hours, and to facilitate the quick handling of the public during the hours of heavy traffic."

Splitting King St. Service. The company also desire to lay down a double track on the north side of Court-street, and south from that street along Toronto-street to connect with Kings. With the granting of this permission the King-street service will be split, the western section to run as far as Church-street and loop-ing Parkdale. This change will cut out the large number of unavoidable and unsatisfactory delays, which have been caused to the West King-street service in the past. During the carrying of heavy traffic night and morning, however, and at all other times when traffic will warrant it, thru cars will be run on the route from Roncesvalles-avenue to the east end. With the granting of the permission asked for Kings and Yonge-streets, the company on Queen-street from east to west."
