A Grist of Amendments to Mr. Pattulio's Measure.

Premier Hardy Introduces Praiseworthy Measure

in Suits Between Workmen and Employes.

Toronto, March 9.-Yesterday Hon. Mr. Hardy introduced his bill to amend the law respecting compensation to workmen for injuries. The measure, which, Mr. Hardy announced, embraced the best features of the English from 65c to \$1 50 per act and discarded those for which the public mind was not ripe, has for its object, first, the placing of the onus of proof with respect to the condition of machinery, etc., upon the employer, and, secondly, the simplifying of the legal procedure and the lessening of a nice range of colors; cost of litigation under the act by means of arbitration. It is left to the plaintiff to decide whether he will proceed to arbitration or by judge and jury. The costs are to be as in the county court; \$10 will be the utmost fee that will be charged for arbitration, and the fees of the court will be the ordinary county court fees. The award of the arbitration is to be filed with the court, and an appeal will lie to the divisional court, whose decision shall be final. The costs will be small, and it will render useful to a much larger extent the workmen's compensation act. In addition to lessening the expenses it will expedite procedure.

Mr. Whitney approved of the effort made both by the attorney-general and Mr. Crawford in their bills to simplify legal procedure, and advocated an extension of the principle suggested to the general legal procedure.

MUNICIPAL BONUSING.

Mr. Pattullo's resolution against the bonusing of industries by municipalities came up for discussion.

Mr. German (Welland), said that while he had a great deal of sympathy with the resolution, he thought it went Hall then delivered the finishing rather too far. Exceptional circumstances had arisen in the past, and they would arise in the future, where special legislation was desirable, and to lay down a hard and fast rule would be unwise. He moved an amendment, seconded by Mr. Pardee, to the effect that the private bills committee should deal with the pending applications from municipalities on their merits, but at the same time should not grant legislation which would not substantially come within the lines of the repealed provisions of the municipal amendment act of

Mr. Clark (West Northumberland) thought they should not take the rights of municipalities out of their hands. Bonusing might have injured Woodstock, but it was not the case with every town. Cobourg, for instance, had gained, instead of losing. He believed it would be in the interests of Toronto that the resolution should be carried.

Mr. Carscallen (Hamilton) was of opinion that the passing of the resolution, with the amended clause, would be productive of very little good, be-cause it would be very difficult for the people of the country to understand just what the opinion of the house was. He thought they should give a strong expression of opinion that it was not the intention of the house to grant any legislation of this kind under any circumstances unless it be shown most conclusively to be to the benefit of the municipality adopting Mt. There should be no special legislation allowing one industry to go from one town or village to another town or village, owing to in-ducements offered. He believed there was a bill of this kind now before the house to remove an industry from Mitchell to Stratford. That should have the unqualified opposition of all the members. Nor should any municipality be allowed to grant a bonus for the purpose of starting an industry. In such cases very feasible arguments might be made, but he thaught that no special legislation of this kind should be passed this kind should be passed.

Dr. McKay (South Oxford) questioned whether they could restrict the petitions from municipalities and from private individuals. There was another power, that could make better inducements to industries to locate therein than the offering of a money bonus by another municipality. Torento, he pointed out, kept a commission, whose chief duty it was to try and induce manufacturers to locate in the city. Dr. McKay then moved an amendment to the amendment. It views with disfavor the rivalry between municipalities in bonuses to industries; provides that two-thirds of the ratepayers shall have voted in favor of such bonus; that no municipality shall grant aid, having a debenture debt of more than ten per cent of the total assessment, exclusive of debts contracted for waterworks, etc., the revenues for which are sufficient to defray the cost of construction and maintenance thereof; that no such bill shall be passed for the purpose of aiding any manufactory or industry when there is another of similar character already established in the municipality, nor to aid any industry already established in another municipality.
