THE CIVIL SERVICE SATURDAY

Mr. Monk's Specious Bill Thrown Out by the House.

The Premier Points Out Its Grave Defection.

Railway Passes Discussed - A Possible Remedy Suggested-A Yukon Tangle Straightened Out.

Ottawa, April 28.—The House yester-day threw out two bills of interest— Mr. Bostock's, to compel railway companies to issue passes to members of parliament, and Mr. Monk's, to comparliament, and Mr. Monk's, to compel the government to grant to every civil servant who is discharged, a statement of all particulars as to the complaints against him. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, in advising the withdrawal of Mr. Bostock's bill, suggested that a proposition to compel subsidized railways to issue passes to members of ways to issue passes to members of parliament, coupled with the abolition of mileage allowance, would probably be fairly considered by the house. The bill was lost without a division.

ASKING QUESTIONS. Mr. Isaac was informed by Sir Louis Davies that the total cost to Canada of the Behring sea commission was \$140,781, of which \$13,903 was paid for traveling expenses of ministers, and \$51,177 for living and traveling expenses of secretaries, attendants, etc., etc., including Canada's proportion of the expenses at Paris. 

AN INTOLERABLE LAW. The honorable gentleman has discussed the bill as if the government existed for the civil service, instead of the civil service existing for the government. If the bill became law the whole system of responsible government such as we have it in Canada would become nil. The civil servant has no more right than the ordinary employe, but exactly the same as any other ordinary servant. He asked his honorable friend if such a law as he had proposed would be tolerated anywhere else but in the civil service. Of course, if a servant be dismissed from office, whether public or private, he has the right to seek from his employer a certificate of character. If his employer is a merchant he has the option to determine whether or not he will give the certificate, and if the refuses to give it, what recourse has the servant? Why should the government be subjected to a condition to which no other portion of sociey is subject? If the government comes to the conclusion that the man should not be kept in the service, the civil service has not greater right against the government than he would have against the private employer. The officials in the building know that they are servants of the public and should not interfere. No one objected to their registering their votes; the law gives them the right to do that. 

Deceased had occasion to cross the track at the time a yard engine was shunting cars, and the running cars struck him, knocking him down, crushing and killing him almost instantly. He was 77 years old and leaves a widow, four daughters and one son, all grown-up.

THE FLOOR GAVE WAY. New York, April 28.-While a sheriff's sale was in progress on the second floor of J. B. Snyder's implement warehouse at Goldsboro, the floor gave way, and about 100 men fell to the floor below. A quantity of machinery fell on the men, and pinned some of them fast. Twenty-three were slightly injured, and several had limbs broken. John Fetrow, a farmer, had both legs broken and was otherwise injured. It is thought he will die.


