# GERMAN ATTEMPT

France tonight reads:

"Under-cover of heavy bombardment the enemy attempted two raids this morning in the region of Monchy-le-Preux and another south of the Arras-Dougt railway. In all three cases the hostile parties were repulsed by our fire, leaving a number of dead in front fire, leaving a number of dead in front of our trenches.

It shows that in Hamilton's 107,000 population, the Anglicans lead with 25,321; Presbyterians second with 19,517; Methodists, 19,327; miscellane ous, 13,316; Baptists, 5,093 and Hebrews 2,651. The balance is divided into many smaller denominations. This is the first time a complete religious census has been taken in Hamilton.
