

"ON THE JUMP" AT THE PATRICIA FOR LAST TIME TODAY

George Walsh at His Best in Comedy Full of Pep and Action.

The purchase of a New York newspaper by the German Government as the first of what was to be a chain of imperially owned publications, is the basis of the plot of "On the Jump," a timely patriotic comedy featuring George Walsh, showing at the Patricia again today.

G. T. R. EMPLOYEES LIKELY TO OBTAIN REDUCTION IN TIME

Also May Ask For Increase in Pay.

It was reported today that the Grand Trunk Railway had proposed reducing the number of hours of labor for the car shops from 36 to 32 hours per week. This report could not be verified, but it followed upon the report that the employees of the Grand Trunk car shops contemplated demanding an increase in wages, which now vary from 15 to 65 cents an hour, the advance to be 75 cents an hour.

This latter report, as far as can be learned, is correct. The men work 8½ hours for five days and 1½ hours on Saturday. With Saturday hours of work remaining unchanged, the new working hours would aggregate 42 instead of 47 hours a week.

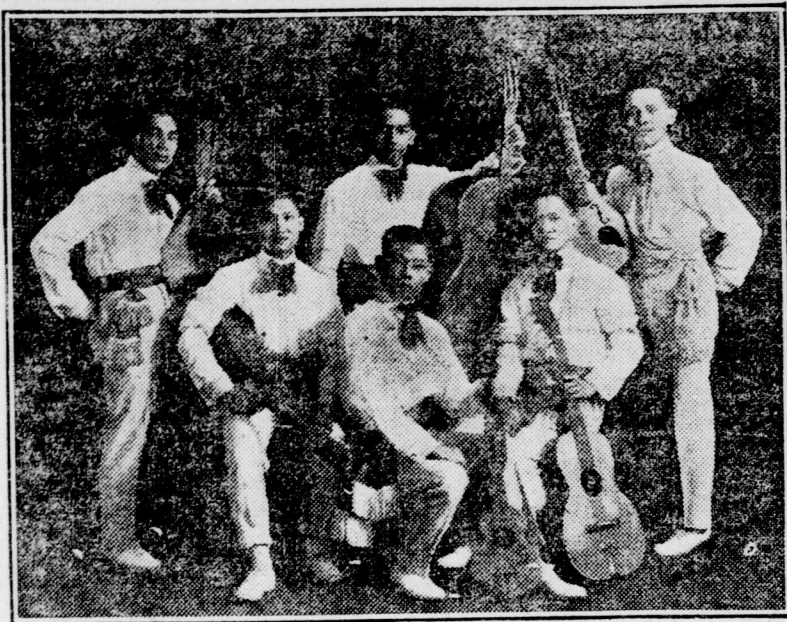

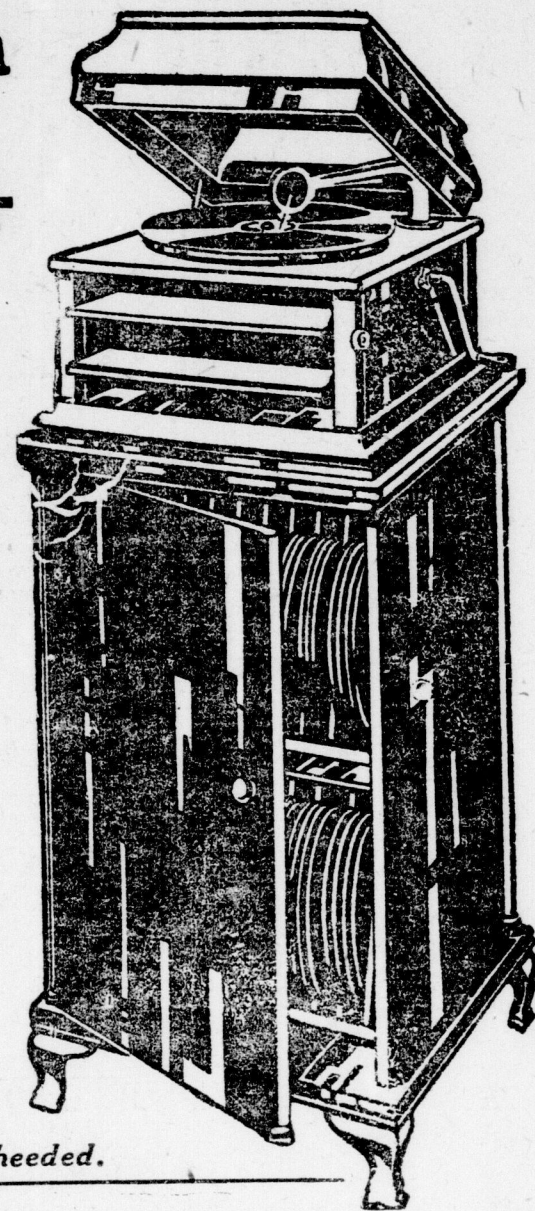

ALDERMEN WIELD AXE ON FIRST PEEP AT 1919 ESTIMATES

Prune Down Those of Engineer and Building Inspector.

For nearly three hours last night No. 2 committee considered the estimates submitted by Building Inspector A. M. Piper and City Engineer H. A. Brazier. They cut the original estimates of A. M. Piper by \$27,133, and those of H. A. Brazier by \$11,000. This was only the preliminary examination, however, and they may be further cut.

Following are the estimates submitted by Inspector Piper: Repairs, etc., to buildings on the Federal Square, \$1,105; cut to \$883. Rev. Byron Snell was chairman for the evening.

City hall, \$1,274; cut to \$250. Fire hall, repairs, etc., \$549; cut to \$428. City buildings, general, \$641; cut to \$236.

Total estimates as presented by Mr. Piper, \$4,919,002; cut to \$2,206,360. The following estimates presented by Engineer Brazier were approved: Auto maintenance (two), \$758. Bathing camp, south, \$1,809.60. Bathing camp, north, \$297. Bridges, \$5,540.

An estimate of \$10,800 for special work of constructing containing walls, filling in and improving east end approach at King street bridge was struck out.

In the city hall estimates Mr. Brazier had included \$1,200 for heating, but the committee thought that \$1,000 should cover this item this year, and struck off \$200. The approved estimate for the city hall is \$6,468.

Railroad crossing maintenance, \$210. Registry office expense, \$55. Street and general improvements, \$33,247.36.

East end weigh scales, \$50. Federal Square maintenance, cutting weeds, etc., \$100. General supplies for the east end town hall, \$50.

For garbage collection and disposal the city will have to pay \$5,112.78, and the owners will pay \$46,524.41 this year. This is the cost of the work last year, which will be paid out of this year's taxes.

NEW COMMITTEE TO GET REPATRIATION BODIES TOGETHER

In order to go into the question more fully, the problem of bringing into closer co-operation the various organizations that are assisting in bringing about the civil re-establishment of returned soldiers was referred, at a meeting of the demobilization committee of the Chamber of Commerce held last night, to a special committee.

The committee which will consist of one representative from the various bodies that have to do with the re-establishment of returned men, and a representative from the Chamber of Commerce, will meet as soon as the members are chosen.

At last night's meeting, representatives from the information and service branch of the soldiers' civil re-establishment commission, the pensions commission, the soldiers' aid commission, the

retirement branch of the S. C. R. C., the vocational branch of the S. C. R. C., the Government labor bureau, the Salvation Army, the Chamber of Commerce, and the Ladies' Aid of Byron Sanatorium, were present.

All were agreed that better co-operation was desirable. Instances were pointed out of overlapping that were unavoidable, because of the duplication of instructions from Ottawa and Toronto. J. K. McDermaid was in the chair. Mrs. John Stevely, as a representative of the Ladies' Aid of Byron Sanatorium, was added to the committee.
