FIRST TOURNAMENT OF ONTARIO RIFLE ASSN. SINCE 1913

Close Shooting Marked Each
of These Events
Yesterday.

TORONTO, Aug. 19.—The first tournament of the Ontario Rifle Association to be held since 1913 opened today at the Long Branch ranges. More than two hundred competitors have entered the various events. The largest proportion of competitors came from Toronto, but Ottawa, Kingston, Hamilton, Port Hope, Brantford and London are also well represented. One special entry is that of Lieut. Morris of Edmonton, a marksman of note, who has on six occasions represented Canada at Bialoy, and has secured second and third places in the King's prize.

Close shooting marked each of the three events shot off today. In the city of Hamilton match, Battalion Sergeant Major G. E. Kent and Pte. R. Oldfield, both of the 110th Irish Rifles, Toronto, tied for the first place with a score of 25, and they will have to shoot off today for the medal which goes with first place. In the MacDonald match Sergeant J. Steele of the 30th Regiment won with 34, while no less than three tied for second place with 33. Among the latter was Sergeant W. A. Hawkins, 48th Highlanders.

NEWTON, Mass., Aug. 19.—The lawn tennis doubles championship of America was won today by Norman E. Brookes and Gerald L. Patterson, the Australian team. They took the title from its defenders, William T. Tilden II. of Philadelphia and Vincent Van Alsen of Yonkers, N.Y., in five spectacular sets, 8-6, 6-3, 4-6, 6-2, on the courts of the Longwood Cricket Club.

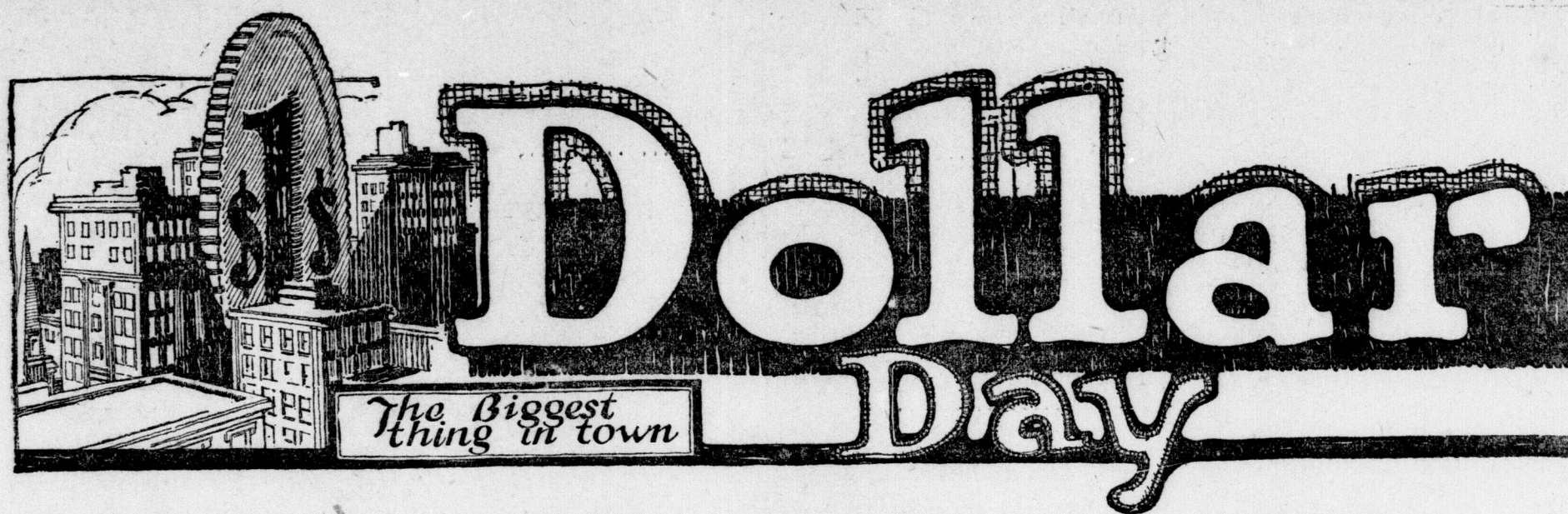
