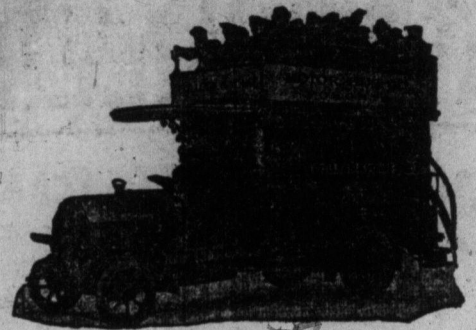

JESUITS IN CANADA

LONDON, May 14.—(C.A.P.)—In the common, recognizing the rejection of the Roman Catholic disabilities bill, A. C. P. Beulson said in recent times the Pope had claimed the right to interfere in the internal government of the British empire. (Cries "No.") He referred to the Jesuits Estates Act passed in Canada in 1888. The Roman Catholic Church had been shown by what had happened in Canada to be not only a religious but also a political body.

The correspondence embodied in the preamble of the act as to the sale of the property of Jesuits showed that the Pope therein granted permission for the sale of land belonging to the crown. (Ironical Nationalist cheers and cries of "Oh.") Moreover the church had fomented against one particular party of state in Canada, thereby interfering with politics.

Prospect For Church Entry. BOSTON, Mass., May 14.—The outlook for visible church unity was a topic which greatly interested a large audience to-day at the Episcopal Church Congress.

The conclusion reached was that there can be no visible church unity without a full recognition of the validity of the priesthood and the sacramental system. One speaker expressed the opinion that no help toward the desired end can be expected from the Roman Catholic Church until the idea of a primacy at Rome supplants that of the papacy.
