

(iv) Have sought the election of candidates in at least three of the provinces and have put into the field at least one candidate for every four constituencies in the immediately preceding general election.

3. It has not been customary to require the CBC to provide such information as the costs of programs. However, the budget of "The Nation's Business" is minimal.

GRANT OF \$300,000 to A.C.F.O.

Question No. 2,827—**Mr. Jones**

1. Did the French speaking Association of Ontario or the counterparts in each of the nine other provinces in Canada receive a grant of \$300,000 and, if so, under what government programme?

2. Was the \$300,000 for use by the Ontario Association only or was it to be divided among all ten provincial groups?

Hon. John Roberts (Secretary of State): 1. Only the French speaking Association of Ontario received such a grant of \$300,000 in 1976-77. This grant was provided by the Official Language Minority Groups Directorate of the Secretary of State Department. The counterparts received grants apart from this but of a less amount.

2. The grant of \$300,000 was given to the French speaking Association of Ontario for the implementation of its animation program and was not to be divided among all ten provincial groups.
