CEDAR HILL CEMETARY Editor, Times—There has always been something that is beyond the understanding of owners of lots in Cedar-hill cemetery, where the man who calls himself the caretaker gets his authority?

It is generally understood that this man is appointed by Mr. Connor, the owner of certain lands, for the purpose of selling to purchasers, lots, from these lands, for burial purposes, but why he assumes control of those lots after they pass beyond the control of Mr. Connor, is what is not understood.

A STUDY IN NAMES What the City Directory for 1907 Reveals.

According To It the City Population is Estimated at 56,505

McAlpine's Directory of the city of St. John, which is just from the press, furnishes as usual some interesting reading. It is larger than usual this year, and contains 18,833 names, which multiplied by three (this seeming to Mr. McAlpine to be a fair basis) give St. John city and Fairville a population of 56,505 souls.

This is probably a little in excess of the true population, but those who are in a position to be well informed as to the city's growth say the estimate is not far astray.

That there is little danger of St. John ever emulating Auburn—that deserted village of which Goldsmith wrote so beautifully, is shown in one statement that in the whole of the city there are but 110 vacant houses and 49 stores. This does not look much as if St. John was in a decadent state.

Of the 18,833 names in the directory, between these two come practically all the names ever heard of and a few that are certainly new ones. A perusal of them, if one had the time, would well repay any student of nomenclature.

The Smiths appear to be the most numerous of the tribes but they are closely followed by the Murphys and Sullivans in the order named. But there are named to suit all classes and creeds. For the gentleman who has a leaning to things theological and all pertaining thereto we have Abbott, Priest, Pope, Bishop, Parsons, Violkens and Church; the fruit culturist will find the Appels, Lemons and Berries; for the military man there is Sergeant and Sargent and for the policeman, Copp; Climatic conditions are well represented by Snow, Frost, Breeze and Storm. To the lover of nature the publisher recommends, Wood, Woods, Forrest, Bush, Rivers, Brooks, Hill, Pond, Grass and Flower. The sportsman will find Hunt, Hunter, Fish, Fisher and Fowler, and the man who has a predilection for gastronomic delights will find comfort and solace in the names of Butcher, Lamb, Fish, Salmon and Partridge.

A particular feature of the directory this year is the publication of the city churches and their pastors.

HAVE YOU SEEN THE NEW COMET Now in Eastern Morning Sky and Moving in Northerly Direction.

GENEVA, July 10—Observations made by Dr. William R. Brooks show that the recently discovered comet is rapidly growing brighter, being more than three times brighter than at the time of its discovery.

It may be observed with small telescopes and soon will become visible to the naked eye.

The comet is on the breast of Aries in the eastern morning sky and is moving slowly in a northeasterly direction toward Taurus.

LUNCHEON ENDED IN A SHOOTING AFFRAY Little Incident Which Illustrates Danger of Lunching With Another Man's Wife.

KNOXVILLE, July 9—Ed. Macklin was shot and almost instantly killed yesterday by Edward McNew, while in the company of the latter's wife. The tragedy occurred on what is known as Luttrell's Bluff.

McNew and his wife's brother and another friend discovered Macklin and Mrs. McNew seated on the grass enjoying a lunch. Macklin and McNew saw each other about the same time and each immediately reached for his pistol. McNew fired first, however. McNew surrendered to the sheriff.

THEY GOT A DUCKING I. C. R. Employees Forced to Ride on Flat Car in Heavy Rain.

A gang of men employed at picking up rails in the vicinity of Rothesay, received an unnecessary ducking yesterday afternoon, and expressed their disapproval of the treatment they received at the hands of the conductor of the special freight.

On account of the falling rain the men stopped working and boarded the special freight to come to the city. The men say that the conductor was generous enough to give them the privilege of riding in on the flat car, and as a result when they reached the city, they showed the effects of the heavy rain. The men were of the opinion that they could just as well have been kept dry by riding under cover, but the conductor did not view the situation in that light.
