Simplicity The Key of Her  
Character - A Home - Lover  
Who Has Keen Interest in  
Social Reform

Writing in the London Bystander under the heading "In England—Now," Blanche says among other things: "Picture to yourself, cousin, the social revolution that is happening in Downing street alone. Why, it's a complete up-throwing of all the traditions and conditions we've clung to like limpets for centuries. The change of houses at No. 10 is one of the coups d'état of these epoch-making days in which we are fashioning the new England. The late chateaux, all that there is of last-worship, strongly flavored with the exclusiveness of blue-blood and the conscious superiority of landed proprietors. The new one—the domestic woman. For all these war and pre-war years, "Margot," who even in childhood conversed with scholars, argued with statesmen and had views on everything that mattered in the world that mattered; who was always in the movement and mostly a little ahead of it; who had no slavish respect for conventions or persons; who was a devotee of the intellectual, great on cults and culture, on clothes, and on all new things, in art, in books, in the theatre. Restless, nervous, autocratic, full of energy, a critic on the hearth. Above all, a personality; utterly independent, having opinions of her own, sufficient unto herself, modernism rampant.

And now—Mrs. Lloyd George, "Mrs. Lloyd George" one reads, "has no ambition to be a political force. She does not care to influence appointments. She is concerned only about her husband's health"—in fact, everything British expects of a British wife and mother. Quiet, retiring, a devoted helpmeet, with absolutely no wish to shine except in the reflected glory of her brilliant husband's radiance. You have only to look at her to see she is untouched by the hectic restlessness that is one of the hall-marks of the newer woman.

Even the modern extravagance in clothes has passed her by; indeed, one does not associate extravagance in any form with England's new "First Lady," and you simply can't imagine her wearing herself to shreds in the throes of Russian ballet and opera, or running a new "ism" or a parade of mannequins from Paris. The Pauline type, you know—"submit yourselves to your husbands," etc. But for all her "womanliness," Mrs. Lloyd George is not "womanly" in the sense that she takes no interest in anything outside her house and home. Social reform finds her always a keen disciple, all the common sense of her class is a boon on committees.

So there we are, you see—instead of complexity simplicity; instead of the Smart Set the Social Democrats. No more of those imprudent luncheon parties with bishops and actresses and peers and poets passing each other the port; no more meetings of "souls" wonderfully arrayed, and dancers wonderfully disarrayed. Instead—a purely political household with only one person that matters in it, and that its master. Delicious antediluvian ideas, isn't it?

**MORE ACCOMMODATION FOR  
SOLDIERS AND CIVIL PATIENTS  
AT JORDAN SANITARIUM**

The large barn at the Jordan Memorial Sanitarium at River Glade is to be converted into a pavilion to provide accommodation for returned tubercular soldiers. The work of remodeling the building will cost in the vicinity of \$15,000. The cost of maintenance will be divided between the local and federal governments, who are co-operating in its remodeling.

If a municipality agrees to pay \$1 per day for each patient, each county or municipality can send incipient cases to undergo treatment at the sanitarium. This will be a new proposition for the municipalities.

In order to provide for the probable increase in civil patients, the cottage formerly occupied by Mrs. Jordan is to be remodelled to accommodate twenty more.

## SAYS POOR PEOPLE BEAR THE BURDENS

"If we regard materials for building construction of more value than human life, then I say that we have reached a very low standard," said James Simpson of Toronto, vice-president of the Dominion Trades Congress of Canada, speaking at the People's Forum in Ottawa on Sunday night.

The speaker stated that while a member of the board of control of Toronto he advocated the purchase of large areas of land by the municipality, on which to build workmen's homes. He had also succeeded in raising the minimum wage of some 13,000 men in Toronto \$15 per week. As a result of the activities of the Socialist, Toronto buys much coal direct from the mines.

Mr. Simpson told of the investigation in 1914 in Toronto, when it was found that the poor people buying coal in small quantities paid 80¢ per ton when others, buying in large quantities, bought it for 57¢.

The speaker stated that a great many were interested in the various descriptions of Socialism. The proper idea of Socialism was that it claimed an equal opportunity for all. By the advantage
