Banks Refuse to Loan Teachers' Two Sentenced To Ten Salaries on Moral Pledge

ATLANTA. Ga., Oct. 18—The city's public schools may be forced to close for the rest of 1926, unless a last minute plan adopted is successful in raising \$500,000 to cover the cost of operation.

The revenue is exhausted and the salaries of teachers for September have not been paid. The teachers have remained on duty, however, as the Mayor, members of City Council and business men have sought to adopt a plan to raise the needed revenue.

Under the city charter the city cannot borrow funds which it cannot pay back before the end of the year, and all funds to be received from all sources this year already have been allocated.
