

BOTH TEAMS CONFIDENT OVER OUTCOME OF FREDERICTON GAME

WANDERERS FAVORITES IF M'COY PLAYS

Odds Will Shift to U. N. B. if Stellar Back Cannot Participate

FREDERICTON, N. B., Nov. 13.—The English rugby season in Eastern Canada reached the first of a series of climaxes today with the final of the home and home games between Halifax Wanderers and University of New Brunswick.

This series is not for any trophy, but it has attracted more attention than any football played in the Maritime Provinces in many years and has emphasized the opportunity for development of inter-provincial championships.

Wanderers arrived last night from Halifax and enter the game today with an eight-point advantage gained in the opening game last Monday at Halifax. They are also slight favorites in the betting to win today, as a result of their expressions of confidence in their ability to at least maintain if they do not increase their advantage.

However, it is conceded that much depends upon whether Ritchie McCoy, the star of the Wanderers back division, will be able to play today, following injuries received in the Thanksgiving Day game at Halifax. If it should be determined that McCoy, despite his own announcement upon arrival here last night that he would play today, is unfit; then odds, it is predicted, will shift so that U. N. B. would be favorites to win today.

MONDAY'S GAME

Following upon the heels of today's game, the U. N. B. team play McGill University's English Rugby team here on Monday in the MacTier Cup final. U. N. B. won the trophy a year ago at Montreal and are to defend the trophy against McGill, the winners of the Quebec-Ontario section. The U. N. B. team was invited to go to Montreal to play the MacTier Cup final, but that invitation was declined with a suggestion that the trip next year, and the Montrealers play that after the U. N. B. team have taken the return trip to Montreal again.

FIELD FROZEN

Ice field, where both games are to be played, has been frozen hard and sheets of ice mark the places where a few mud puddles used to be, so that with hard tacking to be done, some casualties than before the weather came.

ARE MAKING PREPARATIONS

Quebec Hockey Association Getting Ready for Season—McGill Plans

MONTREAL, Nov. 13.—It is expected that the schedule of the Senior Group of the Quebec Hockey Association for the 1926-27 season will be ready soon, the schedule committee awaiting the announcement of the Intercollegiate hockey dates so as not to have conflicting games for McGill and also until the Victoria of Montreal come to some arrangement regarding the question of whether they will play their home games at the Mount Royal Arena as per contract or whether they will again buy off their contract for the year and play at the Forum. These matters are expected to be settled shortly.

McGill has sent out its call for the first hockey practice, the students desiring to try for places on the first team having been asked to file their names with the hockey club manager. Fourteen will be asked to report at the Forum Monday evening, and a similar number will be called out for the next training period that some line may be obtained on the material available for the red team this season.

Ralph St. Germain, Jack McKelvie, Paul Smith, Rog McMahon and McGerrige are among last year's first-string lot, who are still available for hockey at McGill. With Herb Murphy graduated, McGill is short a goal-keeper and unless a dark horse is offering for the nets, the red and white is likely to find the goal question its most formidable handicap this winter.

A few games may be played in the Senior Group before the Christmas season, but generally the league will not get properly under way until after the new year.

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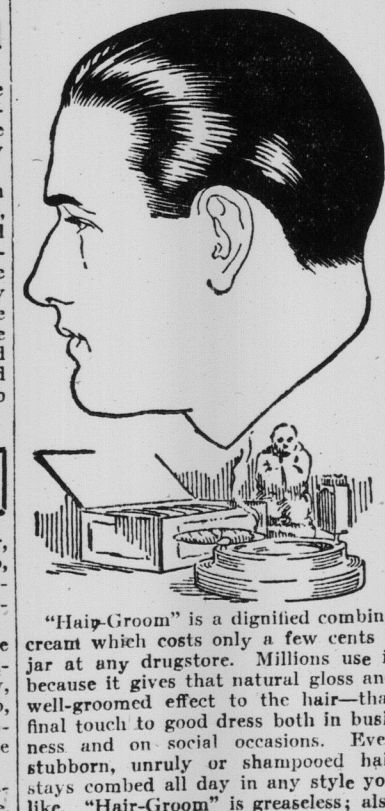

NON-CITIZENS MAY BE BARRED

A. A. of United States to Deal With Important Matters Today

NEW YORK, Nov. 13.—A divided vote on the question of barring non-citizen athletes from amateur athletic competition here probably will be registered by the Metropolitan A. U. delegates to the Amateur Athletic Union's annual convention, which gets under way today in Baltimore. This became known following a meeting of the twelve local delegates who will attend the convention at Baltimore. At the meeting some of the delegates expressed themselves in favor of the amendment to the constitution proposed by Dr. J. J. Walsh, of the St. Anselm's A. C., others were in favor of the measure with modification, and still others were unalterably opposed to the legislation.

In his proposed amendment Dr. Walsh urges that American competitive ranks be closed to non-citizen residents here who, after a lapse of three years, fail to take out citizenship papers, or in the case of foreign athletes resident here who take out first citizenship papers, the competitive fields be closed to them unless the citizenship is completed within three years.

OTHER MATTERS.
This bill of legislation will form one of the principal subjects for action at the convention. Other matters of importance to come up will be the action of the National Registration Committee on applications for reinstatement by athletes who have been disqualified or declared ineligible, the acceptance or rejection of important records by the Records Committee and the Richard indicated his intention of opening negotiations immediately with Paddy Mullins, manager of Wills. CITY LEADS IN THIS BRANCH OF AMUSEMENTS

Now Are 155 Teams Taking Part With More to Start Soon

TWENTY-THREE bowling leagues, consisting of 155 teams, are in operation in this city, according to figures obtained at the various local bowling alleys. This makes the bowling season of Saint John a banner one and places it far above any other town or city in the Maritimes. Nine alleys are available for the use of the public, although leagues are only operating in eight at present. An executive meeting of Saint Peter's Y. M. C. A. will be held tomorrow morning at 11:30 o'clock, when it is expected that plans for the formation of one or more leagues will be made.

At the Central Bowling Alleys there are six leagues in operation, composed of 62 teams. They are the I. O. O. F., Manchester Unity, League, with 12 teams; the Modern Bowling League, with 12 teams; the Weekly Bridge Club League, with eight teams; the Y. M. H. A., with 10 teams; the Nashua Pulp and Paper House League, with eight teams; and the New Brunswick Telephone Company Ladies' League, with 10 teams.

Five leagues are in operation at the Imperial Alleys. The Inter-Association, with 10 teams (this league also operates at the C. N. R. alleys); the Civic and Civil Service League, with eight teams; the Progressive League, with four teams; the I. O. O. F. League, with four teams; and the Imperial League, with five teams.

The Victoria Alleys operate three leagues: The New Brunswick Telephone Company League, with four teams; the C. N. R. League, with 12 teams; and the Printers' League, with four teams. The high single string record for the alleys is 171, held by Fred Gill.

Two leagues operate on the Y. M. C. I. alleys: The House League, with four teams; and the Inter-Society League, with eight teams.

The House League, with four teams, and the Business Men's League, with eight teams, operate on the Y. M. C. A. alleys.

On the Garrison Alleys one league, the Permanent Force House League, with four teams, is in operation. Two more leagues, the Fusiliers' and Machine Gunners' League, will be in operation within a few days.

At the G. W. V. A. alleys the Inter-Association League, with 10 teams, is the only one in operation.

The North End League, with four teams, and the Commercial League, with 12 teams, bowl on Black's alleys. The former league has become so successful that four more teams are being admitted and the schedule is being rearranged.
