CYCLING.

Carpenter-Gibbons Bout.
Georges Carpenter, world's light-heavyweight champion, will be in America early in February for his bout against Tom Gibbons of St. Paul, under the auspices of Promoter Tex Rickard. This information was carried to Rickard yesterday by Captain Mallet, Carpenter's close personal friend in this country. In a letter to Mallet, Carpenter wrote of his plans for coming here to box on a date between March 1 and 5. The French boxer expects to reach here in time to permit a month's training before entering the ring. Carpenter and his scheduled London bout against George Cook, Australian heavyweight, postponed until Jan. 12, because of a severe cold and fever. After this European test, wrote Carpenter, he will arrange to sail for America.

CYCLE.

Italian Win.
New York, Dec. 11.—Following their pneumatic tired steeds at a dizzy speed, Maurice Brocco and Alfred Goulet, Italian-American riders last night spilled their way to a sensational victory in the thirty-first annual six day bike race in Madison Square Garden.

In the final hour of the race they started sprints that lapped three of the riding teams and raised their point-total for the six days to 1232.

Walter Rutt, the veteran German rider, and his partner Coburn, were in the forward part of the fastest sprints and finished second with 431 points.

Lawrence and Thomas were third with 381 points. The three teams covered 2,468 miles and 6 laps, as compared to the record, 2,625 miles made by Dupuy and Egg in 1916.

Hockey Club, a member of the Montreal Hockey League, asserts "that every player, excepting one or two of our team, received payment for their service during the season that our team operated in the said league." They add that they were compelled to pay their players in order to save the \$200 deposited by them as a guarantee of their intention to finish the season.

Isaac Patrick Dead.

Brockville, Ont., Dec. 12.—Relatives here have been notified of the death of Isaac Patrick, manager of the Victoria, B. C., arena, controlled by his cousins, Frank and Lester Patrick, famous stars of eastern Canada. He died in Victoria. Mr. Patrick was a native of South Durham, Que., and was forty-eight years of age. He married Miss Mitchell, cousin of Hon. Walter Mitchell, M. P. elect for St. Antoine division, Montreal. She survives with three children.

statement of the tour of the Scottish professional football team throughout Canada and the U. S. last summer indicate the likelihood of the deficit over all being in the neighborhood of \$3,000, so it was said yesterday by D. Roy, secretary of the Dominion Football Association. Mr. Roy is putting the finishing touches to the financial statement.

Figures already tabulated show the gross receipts in Canada to have amounted to \$63,751, against which the expenses for the conduct of games alone were \$17,467.63. The latter sum is exclusive of berths, meals, hotel expenses and other incidentals. The net receipts from games played in the United States were \$10,550, making total receipts \$74,281. In addition to the game expenses of \$17,467, there is an equal sum for transportation, and the \$25,000 paid over to the players. Total expenses of the tour will approximate \$78,000, according to Mr. Roy's report.

AT SARANAC LAKE AND PLATTSBURG
