**CITY PUBLIC WORKS**  
The city public works department today started placing a sidewalk in Duke street between Charlotte and Sydney. Tomorrow excavation work will be started in preparation for the new pavement. The work of placing a new iron railing on the concrete steps leading to Murray street is expected to be completed tomorrow.

**KINGS COUNTY CASE**  
A case that has aroused interest in Hampton was taken up yesterday before Magistrate Parke in the Hampton court. The case is one against Ernest Ryan, charged with assault upon Mrs. Rose Gamett. The case for the prosecution was closed yesterday and the affair postponed until Friday morning, when the defence will commence its evidence. Ryan was allowed out on sureties of \$500 on his own recognizance and two others of \$250 each, to appear on Friday. E. J. Hensberry of St. John appeared for the complainant, and F. Sproul for the defendant.

**RENFORTH SIDEWALK**  
The work of building a sidewalk at Renforth, from the station to the church, where the road is narrow, was commenced yesterday with the clearing away of the brush which had grown up at the edge and the filling in of parts of the distance to be covered to give a foundation for the sidewalk. The sidewalk, which is being built as a protection both to pedestrians and to the motoring public, will cover the place where most of the traveling accidents along this stretch of the road for some time have occurred. It will be raised three inches above the level of the road and will thus be sharply defined from the road itself.

**CIRCUIT COURT**  
The deferred sitting of the May session of the circuit court was commenced this morning before Judge Barry. A case of James McAulay, John McAulay and Maria Godfrey against Whitman Brewer, W. H. Maxwell and Alfred Brewer in a suit for \$1,500 in connection with the taking of gravel from the McAulay place at Prince Edward, near Musquash, some time last summer was taken up. F. R. Taylor, K. C., and G. Earle Logan appeared for the plaintiffs and W. M. Ryan and P. J. Hughes, K. C., for the defendants. The evidence of Mrs. Godfrey and G. G. Murdoch, C. E., was taken.

**SIX YEARS FOR EX-POLICEMAN**  
Lewis Sentenced by Judge Armstrong—Gullus Gets Four Year Term.

Charles R. Lewis, a former city policeman, was this morning sentenced to serve six years at hard labor in Dorchester penitentiary by Judge Armstrong under the Speedy Trials Act for theft from Eaty & Co.

Aaron Kullik, charged with breaking into a C. P. R. car in Fairville received a sentence of four years. A man named Brownell was previously sentenced for complicity in the same offense and is now serving his term. Both sentences were imposed in the jail.

**GATHER HERE TO BEGIN NOVITIATE**  
Young Men in Preparatory Stage of Work for the Redemptorist Priesthood.

Fifteen young men, graduates from the Redemptorist preparatory college in Brockville, Ont., are assembling in the city today and tomorrow to begin their first novitiate at St. Peter's rectory. On August 1 they will be clothed with the habit of the Redemptorist Order and will begin their year's probation.

Those entering the novitiate are: Henry Donley, Toronto; Edward Doyle, Montreal; Daniel Ehaman, Regina; Henry Fleming, Hamilton, Ont.; Lucien Howard, St. John; Frederick Lane, Regina; Cornelius McElligot, Eganville, Ontario; Gordon McGuiness, Toronto; Michael McLuska, Halifax; Robert McNeill, Tottinham, Ont.; William McNeill, Montreal; Gerald Murphy, St. Johns, Nfld.; Thomas Murray, Quebec; Louis Seillon, Toronto; Gerard Thomas, Quebec.

In addition to these fifteen young men being clothed with the habit, the present class of novices now at the rectory will take their solemn vows and will become members of the order and will then proceed to Mount St. Alphonsus Seminary at Esopus on the Hudson, where they will pursue a course of higher studies for five years, prior to their ordination to the priesthood. It will be the first time that this impressive ceremony was ever held in Canada by the English speaking section of the order.

**BY-LAW CASES**  
Traffic cases occupied the attention of the police court this morning. J. W. Jacobson, charged with speeding and not sounding his auto horn at the corner of City and Sydney street, was fined \$10. The report was made by Policeman Bettle.

Michael McNelly pleaded guilty to speeding and not sounding his horn. He said his battery was getting weak and he was trying to get home before it gave out. He was fined \$10.

Percy Knox, charged by Policeman McNamee with failing to stop when signaled to do so, he misunderstood the signal and thought he was intended to go on. A fine of \$10 was imposed.

Dr. C. M. Kelly, reported by Policeman Young for speeding in Prince Edward street on Sunday morning, said he was going to the infirmary and was late for his appointment, and may have been going faster than allowed. The sitting magistrate said he would consider the case.

Arthur Walsh, reported by Policeman Young for speeding in Prince Edward street, said he was on his way to East St. John with a concert party and did not know that he was exceeding the limit. A fine of \$10 was imposed.

E. Roy Robertson pleaded guilty to speeding at the corner of King and German streets and paid \$10.

M. Marcus was charged with obstructing the sidewalk with two tubs of ice on June 17. Mr. Marcus said the Purdy Ice Cream Company owned the tubs and had placed them there. He was fined \$2 and advised to remove the tubs from the sidewalk as soon as they were placed there.

Friends of Mrs. Rebecca Tool, 90 St. James street west end, will regret to learn of her death which occurred at about eleven o'clock this morning at her home following an illness of about a week. Mrs. Tool was the widow of John H. Tool. She was fifty-seven years of age and had been a resident of West St. John for about forty years. She leaves two sons, Ernest H. and W. Harold, both of the west side; two daughters, Mrs. George W. Cummings and Mrs. Edward Ramsay, also of the west side; three brothers, William Marshall of Toronto, David W. Marshall of Little River, and James C. Marshall of McAdam; and two sisters, Mrs. Harry Gillies of McAdam and Mrs. George Mitchell of Old Loch Lomond Road. They will have the deep sympathy of many in their great loss.

**ROAD WORK**  
Councillor O'Brien of Fairville said this morning that the stretch of road from the Reversing Falls to Manchester's hill has been taken over by the Public Works department and that work of grading it will be started in a few days. He explained that this stretch would be embodied in the roads named to the Dominion government for permanent pavement in connection with the trunk line scheme in 1922 and permanent pavement would be laid. The grading work will be preparatory to laying permanent pavement.

**CARLETON FIRE**  
Chemical No. 6 on the west side was called out this morning by a still alarm for a small fire in a house at 300 King street, owned by W. J. Cornfield and occupied by Abraham Craft. The fire was confined to the window curtains and blinds and a lounge near the windows.

**TRAGIC DEATH OF BOY, KILLED BY AUTOMOBILE**  
Hamilton, Ont., June 20.—Run down by a large car, which passed over his stomach, last night, John Cochrane, a fifteen year old boy, jumped to his feet and exclaimed: "I'm alright. I am not hurt." He then pitched forward, fell unconscious to the ground, and succumbed to his injuries one hour later in the General Hospital.

The car which struck him was driven by Saul Walter, a shoe merchant.
