FURTHER STATEMENTS BY LORD CECIL ON LEAGUE OF NATIONS

Paris, Jan. 24.—(By the Associated Press)—The question of whether the Panama Canal should be internationalized under the league of nations would depend entirely upon the attitude of the United States government.

Speaking of the admission of neutrals into the league on the same basis as other nations, Lord Robert said that it was his conviction that there should be no classification, but that all sovereign independent states should have equal rights.

The question was raised as to whether Germany should be kept out of the league until payment was completed.

He said that no definite proposals had as yet been made regarding the limitation of armaments, which is presenting an extremely difficult problem.
