At Brussels on the morning of October 18, 1918, by order of German Junkers, Nurse Edith Cavell was shot or, to be more precise, murdered. Up to that time the heroic nurse gave her services, unflinchingly to British, French, Belgian and German wounded alike. Nevertheless the slanders of the Lusitania, her to their degenerate breed, condemned her to die without fair trial, and without legal representation.

To perpetuate the memory of this brave woman, the Dominion of Canada has named for her a majestic mountain, Mount Edith Cavell, Canada's Mountain of Tears, down whose side creeps a mighty glacier, which from the distance takes the form of a white robed woman with outstretched arms.
