A TIME TO GO SLOW

A Review and Some Words of Caution to Uncle Sam

(Wall Street Journal.) If possibilities of crop failures, an o demic of cheap politics, the lateness of the season, the possible necessity of choosing between the least of two evils for chief magistrate of this country in the next four years, labor unrest, and small manufacturing profits were all we had to worry about what a happy people we should be. We can handle all these things somehow, however they eventuate. We can make the best of a bad president, a bad crop or a bad bargain, and make a shift to feed our ever-growing manufacturing population, even with a shortage in crops.

But our growth has brought us into international responsibilities, where we have merely a voice without effective control. In some respects we are better off than our European neighbors. We have not joined to any immoderate extent in the struggle for overwhelming armaments. No grandiose scheme of colonial expansion may be laid at our door, and our financial situation is sounder for the present at least than that of important centers elsewhere, notably Germany. But a tabulation of our foreign problems should well make us ask ourselves if this is not a time to go slow.

We have warned Japan away from Magdalena Bay thereby giving her an inexpensive means of keeping us occupied when she so chooses.

We have massed at least the nucleus of what may become an expeditionary force on the Mexican border, and a powerful and unscrupulous element is urging steps in the way of intervention of which no man can see the end.

Our fleet is occupied in restoring order in Cuba, and we are mobilizing a force of sailors and marines to land there with that object. After twice setting the Cuban house in order, who shall say how long or how costly occupation and administration will be, if that necessity is forced upon us.

We owe Colombia amends for our high-handed action in Panama, and the neces-sity of the canal in the business of the world does not obliterate the debt. With all these distinctly American prob-lems, can we suppose that the Latin na-tions of the continent do not distrust us or would not misconstrue strong action in Mexico or Cuba? And yet we were never more committed to the Monroe docnn Mexico or Cuba? And yet we were never more committed to the Monroe doctrine. Can we afford to tie our hands?

We have the enormous responsibility of the Philippines to consider, and we are lending money to China, thereby entering into complicated relations with European Powers. Congress apparently believes in a small navy. The strained relations between Germany and England may not protect us if Germany sees a favorable opportunity to challenge the Monroe doctrine. We may even be forced to leave its defence to Great Britain, whose great minister, Canning first suggested it. But is this a desirable alternative?

Of all nations in the world have we not enough complications on our hands? Is not this a time to go slow?
