



CURFEW IN FREDERICTON The law 'for the protection of children under the age of twelve years' which was recently passed by the Fredericton coun-cil will come into force on August 1. This law states that. ''no child under the age of twelve years shall be allowed upon any public street, park or other public place within the city of Fredericton after the hour of nine o'clock in the e'ening of any day during May, June, July, August, Sep-tember and October, and after eight o'clock in the evening of days during November, December, January, February, March and April, unless accompanied by an adult per-son in charge of the child. If any child is allowed upon the streets after the aboved mentioned hours the parent or guardian is guilty of an offence and liable to a penalty not exceeding \$20." 
