

PLANTING PEARL CROP. (Thrill Magazine.)

The finest fresh-water pearls are found in the shells of mussels gathered in the Mississippi River and its tributaries. Upwards of 500 varieties of mussels are found in these waters.

Plans are being carried out by the United States Bureau of Fisheries to assure a supply of pearls in years to come. A large crop planted this year will be available about 1928. The extent of the industry is surprising. A careful study of the subject is being carried out in a laboratory at Fairview, Iowa, which is serving to develop the industry.

What Is a "Radio Set?"

A radio receiving set is an instrument which, when connected to an antenna, either of the wireless wire loop type, is capable of converting the high frequency ether or wireless waves into air or sound waves, enabling the listener to hear speeches, broadcast programmes, or telegraphy.

Throughout the United States, educational institutions, including colleges and universities, are broadcasting programmes in which instruction, instead of entertainment, is carried by the ether waves.

A Tube for Two Filaments.

Tubes made with two filaments use only one filament at a time. Because the filament is the vulnerable part of the tube, the two filaments are wired to double its usefulness. When one burns out, the other is put to work, whereby the expense of another tube is saved.

Practical Pointers Concerning All Its Branches.

Wire for Antenna

One pound of No. 16 copper wire is the correct span for receiving stations which pick up broadcasting stations operating and 400-meter wave lengths.
