ONTARIO'S PRIZE WINNERS IN THE SHEEP EXHIBIT.

The Breeds Represented at the Exhibition—Some Statistics on the Attendance—Recent Arrivals of Ontario Vegetables and Cheese.

JACKSON PARK.

The fates have been kind to the White City. From the first of June till the

past week or two, hardly a drop of rain fell. The temperature has at no time

been excessively hot, and there was never a day unpropitious for sight-seeing till

attendance varied from 145,000 to 225,000, the total for the week being about a

round million, with a grand aggregate since May 1st of 15,700,000. For several

days the railways have been actually

swamped for lack of cars to carry passengers and power to haul them, and

the evening's dispatches say that thousands who had bought tickets were unable

to obtain transportation. To-day's arrivals are estimated at 200,000, and every hotel in the city is crowded to the

roof, while in the best known of them, only, and several in a room at that, are to be obtained.
