London, Aug. 15.
The House of Lords has decided the appeal in the bankruptcy case of Overend, Gurney & Co which was brought before them, in favor of the liquidator.

New York, Aug. 17.
A very severe storm has prevailed for the past two days along the southern coast, and railroads and crops in some sections have suffered severely. Washington, Baltimore, and Philadelphia have been flooded, and great injury done to the streets. Two lives lost by drowning at the last annual city.

The action of the House of Lords last Tuesday evening in rejecting its amendments to the Reform Bill, placed both Houses in complete accord on that great measure. The Bill has finally passed Parliament, and having received the assent of Her Majesty is now a law of the land.

Ten persons were killed and twenty-eight injured by falling buildings. Of 1500 inhabitants, 400 are homeless.

The Empress Charlotte is in better spirits and her mental condition was slightly improved. She knows Maximilian is dead, but fancies he died from fever.

The cholera had somewhat declined in Rome but was extensively virulent at Frascati and several villages in the mountains.

AN OLD PIONEER.—We had a visit the other day from Elias Trux, well known in this region of country, who is now 95 years of age, and appears as hale and healthy as if he was only between sixty and seventy. He walks erect, uses no walking stick, and is as active in his motions as a much younger man. He was born in Albany, State of Vermont, July 4, 1772, and came to Canada in 1792. He had 11 children, 42 grandchildren. He is said to have cut the first trees in the townships of Dunham and Stanbridge, 75 years ago. He is at present living with his son in Franklin, Vermont, but pays frequent visits to other members of his family living in this township. [Bedford, E. T., Times.]

Engineer Hailey has nearly completed the survey of the Hudson River Railroad. The depot will be located in the city of Albany. The line to the boat-dock will be less than four miles in length, and as no streams are crossed will save the necessity of building bridges, which will materially lessen the expense so that the road can be built very cheaply in comparison with other lines. We should, with the co-operation of our Provincial neighbors, commence the work and with as little delay as possible build the road to the junction at Richmond. [Houlton Times.]

The effects of the late gale at Bridgeport, Lunenburg County, were disastrous. Private barns were blown down, and several smaller buildings more or less damaged. The crops have suffered severely, and some orchards have been almost completely denuded of fruit.

In Weymouth the damage was considerable. In Prince Edward Island, the gale was furious. At Charlottetown five schooners were driven ashore. One of them had her side stove and another her stern stove in. The grain crop in the Island was considerably injured.

The Orange demonstrations in the North of Ireland have passed over without any violation of the peace. The Orangemen were not molested, and consequently there was no disturbance. The demonstration at Bangor was an imposing and important one, being attended by at least 40,000 persons. 30,000 of the Orangemen of Ulster assembled in Belfast, and marched through the city in procession. Resolutions were passed at an open air meeting in favor of the repeal of the Proscriptions Act. Sandy Row and Pound were crowded, but there was no rioting. The military and constabulary patrolled the town.

We have just received information of a sad and distressing calamity, which occurred at Sydney, C.B., on Saturday last, by which Clement H. Harrison, Esq., lost two daughters, one 17 years of age, the other about 14. They with some other young ladies, had gone for a sea bath, and taking each other by the hand walked out beyond their depth, got into the channel of the harbour, and sank to rise no more. Their bodies were recovered about an hour afterwards, and interred on Monday, 12th inst. [Halifax Express.]

THE GOVERNMENT.—We learn from report that the local Government has been reconstructed. Why it was not long since, we cannot imagine, unless indeed the opposition had something to do with the delay. The new members as reported are, Hon. A. R. Wetmore, without office; Hon. Charles Skinner, Solicitor General; Mr. Kerr of Miramichi, it is said will accept the office of Provincial Secretary. Hon. R. Sutton of Northumberland and Hon. A. C. Desbrosses of Restigouche will be appointed member of the Council without office. It is probable that the Hon. Chas. Fisher, at present Attorney General, will be elevated to the Bench, and Hon. Charles Connell, will resign his office, as it is generally believed he will be a Candidate for the House of Commons. We stated in a previous number that the Hon. Messrs. Tilley, Wilmut and Mitchell, had resigned. Judges Stevens and Chandler's resignation of their seats will it likely be tendered this week.

The Writ for the Elections are published to-day.

Portland, Aug 13—Schr Quickest, of St. John, N. B., loading at Mary's Point, drove ashore in the gale of the 2nd inst., a total wreck. She was valued at \$3,000.

Brig Brill, McMillan, from Havana, 22nd ult., which arrived at Boston on the 13th inst., reports 2nd inst., lat 37 15, lon 15 08 in a gale from SSE to E and NSW, lost foretop mast stay, split topmast, and stove tankworks.

Ship S. L. Tilly, (The) Crowell, from Savannah for Liverpool with a cargo of timber, was encountered a gale from S E, and at 4 p.m., laid the ship under lower maintopmast, 10 p.m. the gale was still increasing, a fearful sea running, and the ship laboring heavily, all hands at the pumps, at midnight the binnacle was washed overboard; off the skids. On the 3rd 12 30 a.m., started deckload, and was obliged to abandon the pumps; the fore and maintopmast went over the sides, and at 12 45 the rudder was twisted off between rudder post and upper band; saw that it was impossible to save the ship, and gave orders for all hands to look out for themselves. The next sea struck the ship abaft the main rigging, and bore her down on her beam ends, washing over board the second mate, steward cook, two seamen, and two boys. The rest of the crew lashed themselves to the weather rigging, dead eyes. [The S. L. T. registered 701 tons, rated A2, was built at St. John, N. B. in 1856, and hailed from Yarmouth, N.S.]
