SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN MONTHLY WEST LAND REGULATIONS

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intended homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his family.

In certain districts a homesteader is required to pre-empt a quarter-section of available Dominion land. Price \$6.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate 50 acres.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchase homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$500.00.

PANIC IN THEATRE

Twenty-Six Killed and Twenty-Five Hurt in Struggle

SMALL BOY CRIED "FIRE"

Crowd in Picture Show Alarmed at Boy's Shout Rushed for the Door and Fall Down Stairs—Audience Rage Over Them and the Women and Children Are Suffocated Under the Heap of Humanity.

Canonsburg, Penna., Aug. 28.—Twenty-six dead from suffocation, twenty-five seriously injured, thirty suffering from minor hurts. That is the human toll exacted Saturday night during an inexcusable panic at a moving picture show in the Canonsburg Opera House. The moving picture machine developed a slight defect. There occurred a noise like a "click." A small boy shouted "Fire!" at the same time starting for the narrow exit. A giant in proportions, jumped from his seat and ran wildly for the same exit. In a moment there was a fighting, struggling mass after him. At the head of a narrow stairway, which led to the street, the foreigner tripped. As he rolled down the stairs he swept others from their feet, who were waiting their turn to enter the theatre, and soon there was an indescribable pile of humanity at the foot of the steps, battling like mad.

It was all over within a short time. Volunteer firemen, several policemen and a few level-headed citizens untangled the human mass. The unhurt and those slightly injured were pulled from the top of the pile. As they gained the street they ran screaming like maniacs to all parts of the small town. Next came the more seriously hurt, and these were sent home or taken to nearby houses, while a few were rushed unconscious to hospitals. Then the rescuers came to the silent forms of those who had reached the fatal stairway first. One after another the victims, many of them women and small children, were carried to the sidewalk. All had been suffocated, and the faces showed terror.

Coroner James T. Heffernan has begun a rigid investigation. He arrived at the scene early yesterday morning and within a short time had secured a jury. Measurements taken by members of the jury showed the stairway leading to the second floor of the building, the main floor of the opera house, to be only six and one-half feet wide, while the door at the bottom was not more than eight feet wide.

It is customary to give two or three performances each evening, and Saturday night the picture machine operator was about to complete the first when a film parted. Some of the audience had already commenced to leave the building and other persons were on the stairs when the picture machine started to move. The bodies of the audience members who were on the stairs, and who had gone down, and breaking the glass transom over the door, rolled through and dropped into the street.

During this time Manager Ferguson had endeavored to stop the panic. Accompanied by his wife he started for the stairs when the first alarm was given, but seeing there was no escape there, he made his way to the stage. Calling loudly to the frightened crowd to get out, he led the way to the rear of the stage, and fully three hundred escaped in this way. Of the twenty-six killed, thirteen were children, seven of them pupils in the public school. Yesterday it was decided by the school authorities to postpone for a week the opening of the schools.

One Way of Lowering Prices. New York, Aug. 28.—The fourth attempt in three weeks to blow up a butcher shop occurred here on Saturday. The explosion, which was believed to have been the work of a bomb-thrower, was taken high, and to protest against the high price of meat.

The bomb which exploded early on Saturday in front of a shop on Christie street smashed all the windows in that establishment and the one adjoining and blew a large hole in the sidewalk, but hurt nobody. The occupants of the neighboring tenements swarmed out into the streets and the police reserves were called to quiet the panic.

Sea Monarch Launched. Quincy, Mass., Aug. 28.—New standards in naval architecture and construction, particularly in size, are set by the Argentine Republic's new super-dreadnought battleship Rivadavia, which was launched at the yards of the Fore River Shipbuilding Co. on Saturday.

When completed, the ship will have a displacement of 25,000 tons, approximately 1,500 tons heavier than the greatest projected sea-fighters of the United States, and the Lion, Great Britain's new queen of the sea.

Killed in Race. Elgin, Ill., Aug. 28.—Near the end of the road race Saturday, Sam Jacobs, mechanic for Dave Buck, was killed and Buck himself was injured when the Pope-Hartford in which they were speeding left the track and turned completely over.

Buck was traveling at about 60 miles an hour when he threw a tire. His car jumped out of the track, throwing the driver off and inflicting what may prove fatal injuries. His machinist was crushed to death instantly.
