AUSTRALIAN FEDERATION.

There is little doubt that the union of the Australian colonies into a federation similar to the Dominion of Canada is very near at hand. New South Wales, which until now held aloof from participation in the Australian Federal Council, is now apparently strongly in favor of federation, resolutions having been adopted at a public meeting held at Sydney on Saturday last, declaring that a federation of the colonies should be brought about at the earliest possible period.

The colonies which are now represented in the Council are Victoria, Queensland, South Australia, Tasmania, Western Australia, and Fiji.
