People in Durfines have complained of the fact that the want of a few miles of road shuts them off from a view of the sea on the west side of the Sound, and the two sections would only cement in united aspect perhaps the government would not long delay the construction of a road in this section which it has so long elected to desert.

This is only an instance where the lay of the land interested by a natural waterway is valuable testimony to the fact that the water of the Sound which would prove of an incalculable benefit to the entire population who dwell anywhere along the shores of Barkley Sound.
