The following lumber was exported from Richibucto to United Kingdom. The effect of the meeting has been published much criticism on the report, announced on Friday last, while it is not yet a month since the meeting, the subject, it would not in the future be likely to be again so much discussed.

The following was shipped from Richibucto to United States. From Richibucto to St. Pierre, 65,000 lumber. Of fish shipments there were shipped, France to U. States, value, \$42,277. To Canada, value, \$10,000. Total value, \$52,277.

The value of eggs shipped from Richibucto was \$10,510. In lumber, Mr. George McLeod shipped a large quantity in barges to Miramichi, which is not accounted for in the report.

In the export of canned fish several shipments were made from Halifax, St. John and P. E. Island, and do not appear in the foregoing, although manufactured in Kent. Coagoo being an outpost under the survey of Moncton its exports are now credited to the latter port.

The total deal shipments, last year, of Richibucto, including outputs of Houtouche and Coagoo, were 21,090,000 lbs. against 12,208,700 lbs. in this year.

Kent County Notes. RICHIBUCTO, Nov. 11, 1884. RAILWAY WORK.—Work is progressing rapidly on the Richibucto and St. Louis Branch Railway. Fully four miles have been graded and are ready for the sleepers. Between fifty and sixty men are now employed on the line. Mr. John C. Bova, the contractor, deserves every praise for the enterprise and spirit displayed by him in the construction of the road.

THE FREIGHT TRAFFIC on the branch line from Richibucto to Kent Junction is constantly increasing and thus far has exceeded the expectations of its promoters. In the passenger trade there is also a fair increase.
