OLD FORT CUMBERLAND.

The Telegraph puts forth a plea in favor of the Dominion Government taking some steps for the purpose of preserving the historic ruins of old Fort Cumberland...

The work on the fortifications at Wei Hai Wei is pressed forward with feverish haste. The old forts have been strengthened, new ones are going up, and all the weaker points are being covered with earthenworks.

The fear of the Japanese attack has increased recently and more torpedoes and mines have been laid in the bed of the Min. The river has been so carefully fortified that navigation has become dangerous.

The Shanghai representative of the Central News positively reaffirms the statement that a small uprising has taken place at Ku Lao Hwei, 200 miles from Han Kow, in which two inferior officials were killed.

The Paris Journal des Debats, in an article on the situation in the East, says that the European powers cannot interfere in any way with Japan's success.

The Chinese fleet which has been undergoing repairs at Fort Arthur, is expected to be ready to start on a cruise in the Yalu river at a point thirty miles northeast of Chulung Cheng.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 19.—The Novoye Vremya declares that in the event of the military intervention of Great Britain in Afghanistan, Russia will be compelled to take similar action.

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WAR IN THE EAST.

China Prepared to Negotiate for Peace.

LONDON, Oct. 18.—The Daily News today publishes this semi-official statement: "A day or two ago after the last Cabinet Council China informed Great Britain that she was prepared to negotiate for peace on certain terms. Great Britain made overtures to the powers on a new basis of negotiation. Japan did not reply definitely, but has not rejected the proposal."

The Shanghai correspondent of the Central News says that the Chinese Government is making great efforts to raise a domestic loan, offering 7 per cent interest. Several millions have been taken already.

A rebellion has broken out in the district around Foo Choo and rebel prisoners are coming into the city by hundreds.

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A BOMB FOR BLAKE.

White Hon. Edward Blake is Thinking of an Old Man's Bomb Firing and Leaves the Building.

NEW YORK, Oct. 18.—The World this morning says: "The reception given by the Irish National Federation to Edward Blake, M. P. at the Lenox lyceum last night was productive of some results never dreamed of by its organizers."

In the heat of the meeting and while all eyes were turned upon Mr. Blake as he stood on the platform delivering one of his most impressive periods, a short, stout, bushy, flashily dressed, bent old man with the hair, mustache, hook nose and stooping shoulders peculiar to the popular conception of an anarchist, walked swiftly around the back of the front tier of boxes until he reached the last row nearest the platform and to the left of the proscenium arch.

In his hand he carried an old, bulky, greenish umbrella, which he seemed to hold with peculiar tenderness. Outside the box he stopped, hesitated a moment and then entered a chair in a corner nearest the speaker. On the other side of the aisle a couple said to Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Thompson. The old man left in a minute.

It might have been a minute or two later when a sharp cry from the woman in the box rounded through the house startled every one from their seats and stopped the speaker. In the same moment there leaped out a flash of smoke and flame, and followed the shriek of "fire" and the simultaneous movement of five hundred panic-stricken creatures to the door.

But even as they turned patrolman Lilly rushed into the box, violently dancing on something with his foot while the stenographer's voice of Mr. Blake ran through the building calling his audience to keep their seats.

Those in charge of the meeting tried to hush up the affair. Joseph F. Ryan at first incautiously admitted that the bomb was one of the typical nitro glycerine variety.

On a signal from the roudman, however, he tried to explain that it was nothing more than a big cracker. Mr. Blake's address was devoted to defence of the coalition policy lately adopted by the Liberal party.

NEW YORK, Oct. 18.—Much disorder prevailed last night at a meeting of Irish sympathizers, called to be addressed by Edward Blake, M. P. Many bogus tickets were presented by persons supposed hostile to the meeting and a disorderly crowd gathered at the doors of the Lenox lyceum, where Mr. Blake was to speak.

BLESSING THE COLORS.

Imposing Military Function at Berlin To-day.

BERLIN, Oct. 18.—At ten o'clock this morning the color companies of the regiment of the Guards Corps formed in line at the Berlin Arsenal and marched to the monument to Frederick the Great, in front of which had been erected an altar which was decorated with drams, two guns and masses of flowers. To the right of the altar stood the sovereigns of the various German states and the German Princes, and to the left Chancellor von Capriv, with the commanders of all the one hundred and thirty-two regiments. The Emperor and King of Serbia viewed the scene from the balcony of the Palace of the Emperor.

Shortly after twelve o'clock the Emperor, accompanied by the King of the First Regiment of the Guards attached to his person, with the 32nd w standards, left the arsenal for the spot where the ceremonies of the day were to take place. The Emperor and his escort were accompanied by twelve bands, which played continuously until the altar was reached. Crown Prince Frederick William commanded the 132 color bearers, and his orders to the march were given in a clear and audible voice.

His Majesty said, in substance: "I had over to the new Fourth Battalion their colors, entrusting them to the care of the commanders of the regiments. October 18 is a day of memory for the army and the country. I look towards the mausoleum, where rests the body of him who led to victory the colors consecrated on this spot in 1861. This day reminds us of my heroic father, who carried the colors consecrated then against our foreign foes. He reminds us, too, that it was in 1861, when my grandfather was misunderstood, regarding his intentions and his plans for the reorganization of our army and was much combated and criticized and censured—so it is today. But he was justified in his re-organization of the army by subsequent events. Then, as to-day there was much discord, prejudice and criticism. The only pillar of the country was then as it is today—the army. Unconditional discipline alone can hold the army together and this I demand from you and expect today, as it was expected and given by me."

THE EMPEROR continued: "Commanders: 'I give to you the colors. Cultivate in your men the old traditions and your own courage. Remember, as the former army of Germany followed their faithful till death for their Emperor against foes abroad and at home.'"

THE EMPEROR concluded his address with these words: "May God grant us His victory. Remember that called for three cheers for His Majesty, which were heartily given, and the troops marched in review before the Emperor."
