BERLIN, Sept. 23—There was a remarkable demonstration here yesterday of the fraternity of English and German Socialists and trades unionists. It eclipsed anything of the kind ever seen in Berlin. The British Labor members of parliament who have been attending the Inter-Parliamentary Union Congress were the guests of and presented addresses successively to two huge gatherings of Socialist Trades Unionists and Liberal Trades Unionists, who, for political reasons, refused to amalgamate in a joint demonstration. The scenes of amity and enthusiasm at both meetings were quite extraordinary.

Fred Maddison, Radical member for Burnley and a prominent Trades Unionist, presented am address on behalf of British workmen, signed by 48 members of parliament and more than 3,000 trades union officials. The address embodied a protest against the talk of trouble between Germany and England, and put forth the claim that the Anglo-French entente was due to the efforts of the workingmen. It also invited German workingmen to co-operate with their English brethren in founding an Anglo-German entente, and at the same time secure a reduc Fred Maddison, Radical member for tion in the construction of costly arm

Mr. Maddison, in supporting the ad-Mr. Maddison, in supporting the address, pledged the English workmen to untiring efforts to secure the settlement of international quarrels by arbitration. Englishmen and Germans, he said, wanted to trade with one another port to the other not to fight.

ST. PETERSBURG, Sept. 23. — A dramatic story of a conflict between Russian soldiers and Chinese police is in the Blagovescrensk newspapers received in St. Petersburg. The conflict is a striking comment on the changed relations between the two nationalities

The ferry started, and all was calm as it crossed the river, but immediately it touched the opposite bank the quarrel broke out again, and seven men—three Russians and four Chinese—were thrown overboard. They were rescued by the police boats, but the craft that contained the Chinamen was attacked and sunk by the Russian crowd on the bank. was attacked and sunk by the Russian crowd on the bank.

Meanwhile the Russian soldiers were slashing right and left on board with their sabres, injuring their own countrymen as well as the Chinese police.
